Brampton, March 2—Dr. S. H. Smith, who has been tax collector, clerk and treasurer of the village of Streetsville since 1909, was sentenced in police court to-day by Magistrate L. J. G. Bull to one year imprisonment and one year intermediate in the Ontario reformatory for theft and embezzlement of the village funds, involving \$12,963.28. Through counsel, Dr. Smith offered insurance policy totaling \$15,500 by way of restitution. He entered a plea of guilty.
