A generous response was made to the appeal recently made for contributions of supplies for relief in the southern portion of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The response was so large that the quantity of goods that was shipped up at the doorway of St. Paul's school-room by noon yesterday. This is all sides the shortage of vegetables in this area as well as the constant calls for local relief.

Two years ago when a similar appeal was made, this district made the largest contribution for an entire area. On this occasion, Milton was asked to lead in loading a car along with Louisville, Hornby, Kilbride and Carleton.

The truck that left the curb shortly after one o'clock, was piled up to capacity with bags of potatoes, apples, turnips and pumpkins, boxes containing other vegetables, canned fruit, supplies of clothing, bedding and quilted clothing and shoes. Special mention should be made of a large quantity of clothing, bedding and quilted supplies contributed through the W.M.S.
