

**Halton Public School
Music Festival**

The second and last section of the Halton County Public School Music Festival was held in the Milton High School, on Saturday, May 12th, commencing at 9 a.m. Standard Time, and closing at 8:30 p.m.

As on the former occasion, Mr. Peter Kennedy, of Toronto, acted as adjudicator, and after each class gave very helpful criticism to the contestants, commencing with them on the high class performance, and stating that there was a decided improvement over last year.

After each class, also, the medals and trophies were presented to the winners by Inspector J. M. Dwyer, assisted by Mrs. G. Agnew, of Acton, Orono Nafel and Mr. F. W. Cooke, of Milton.

At the close, the President, Mrs. G. C. Atkins, expressed the appreciation of the Association for the splendid co-operation of all who had helped to make the Festival the fine success it was.

Last year, there were 280 entries, this year 304. Of last Saturday's entries, there were 16 choirs, the others being vocal and instrumental ensembles, a total of 124.

The representative to the meeting will include: One from each rural school board; two from each town or incorporated village school board; one from each separate organization, such as Women's Institute, Daughters of the Empire, Council of Women and Home and School Clubs.

The Acton W.M.S. invited the Presbyterial to meet in Acton next year. Supplementary Hay and Pasture Crops for 1934.

A very dry summer and an exceptionally cold winter have very seriously damaged the hay seedings of grasses and clovers in many parts of Ontario and on many farms there is a pressing demand this spring for supplementary hay and pasture crops.

The price information and answer questions coming from all parts of the province. Prof. W. J. Squirell, of the Ontario Agricultural College, makes the following suggestions:

PEAS AND OATS. A mixture of strong growing, large strawed, many leaved varieties of these crops, such as O.A.C. No. 144, O.A.C. No. 72, or Banner Oats and Golden Vire, Russian Blue, or O.A.C. No. 181 field peas yield excellent returns of high quality hay when sown at the rate of two bushels of oats and one bushel of peas per acre, a total seeding of three bushels per acre.

This mixture has been successful on most types of soil. It should be sown in early spring on a well prepared seed bed. It is ready to cut for hay when the peas pods are half grown, the methods used in cutting being the same as for any other hay crop.

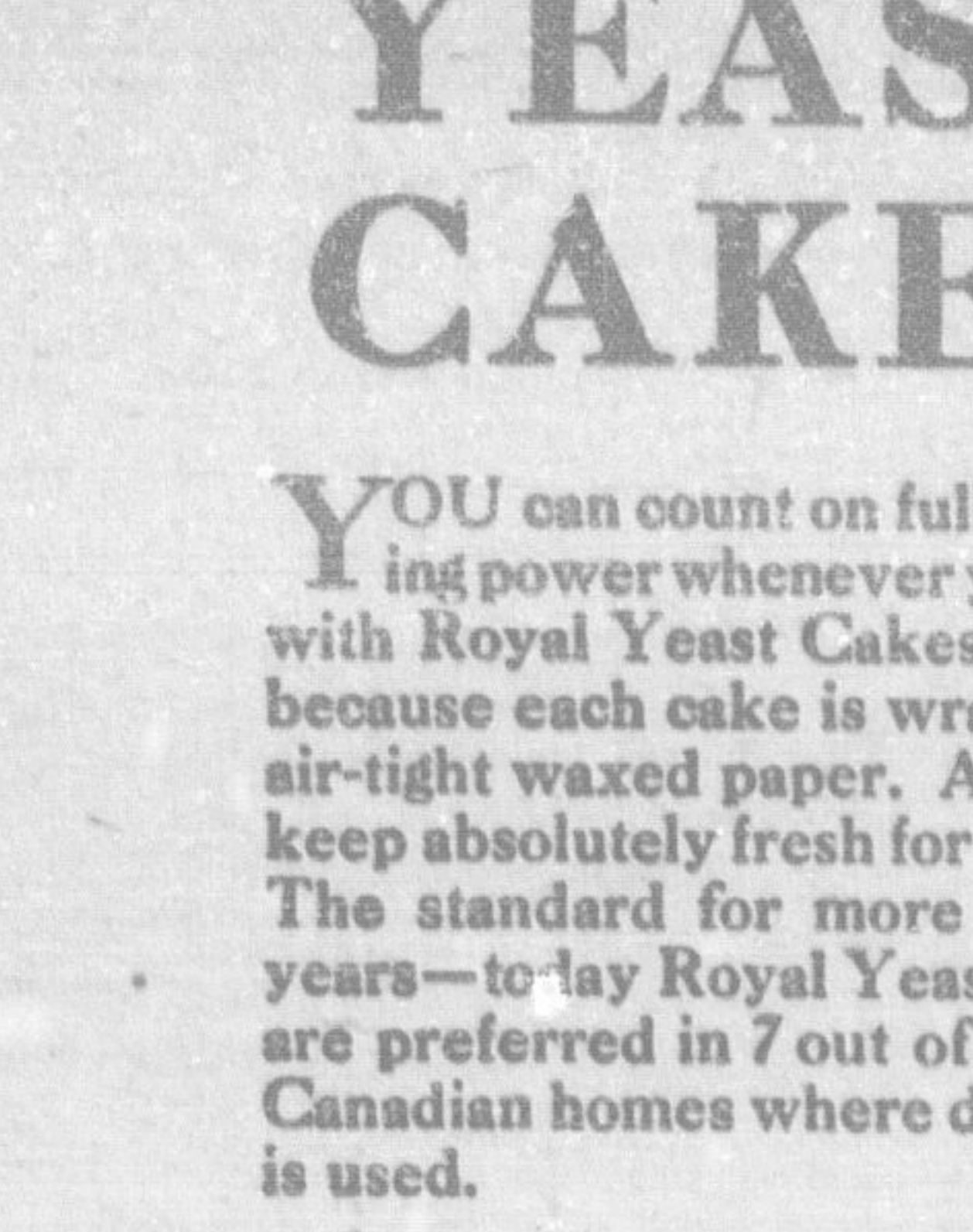
