

Hydro Results and Accomplishments in Milton.

Toronto, June 26.—Milton's total of reserve and surplus accumulated in its local Hydro system is \$148,177 up to the end of 1933, according to the new municipal Hydro statistics just completed by Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission statisticians.

The average cost of electricity to Milton lighting consumers is now 10.5 cents per kilowatt hour. The cost compares with a rate of 10 cents per kilowatt hour in effect prior to the entry of public power.

Hydro's low rates, of course, made possible Milton's present large consumption of electricity for domestic purposes, but if pre-Hydro rates were applied to present consumption Milton residents would be paying about \$40,000 per year, additional to their electricity bills.

Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission experts have computed that the total saving to Hydro consumers all over Ontario passed the \$600,000,000 mark at the end of 1932.

In the provincial field the people's light and power business improved materially as to load condition and financing during 1933. From its low point in 1929 the load supplied by the provincial commission recovered throughout the summer months of last year.

During last year \$3,000,000 was added to Commission reserves, making a total of \$60,000,000.

By actual computations Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission statisticians have estimated that Ontario Hydro users would be paying \$50,000,000 a year additional for service if they paid the average rate in effect in Ontario last year.

According to 1933 figures the provincial peak load has grown in the decade from 1,511,038 horsepower to 2,288,000 horsepower.

The number of municipalities served has increased from 368 to 757; total number of consumers has increased from 357,983 to 617,000 (including rural); capital investment (Hydro) has increased from \$179,000,000 to \$288,000,000; capital investment (municipalities) has increased from \$90,000,000 to \$112,000,000; and the number of rural customers in number from 7,700 to 62,000.

BIG INCREASE SHOWN IN GOOD-YEAR SALES

The number of the tire units produced and sold by Goodrich Tire and Rubber Company of Canada in the first six months of the present year shows an increase of 64.8 per cent. over the same period of 1932, according to C. H. Carleton, president, in a letter going to shareholders with dividend cheques for the second quarter of this year.

Other lines of products manufactured by the Company shows a very much greater per centage of increase and the Company has materially improved its position in the industry, states Mr. Carleton.

During the first six months of 1934 dividends have been earned and surplus increased. Earned surplus, as of June 30th, after deducting dividends for the six months, stands at \$8,089,421, or \$713,870 higher than a year ago.

In addition, there is a capital surplus of \$408,008. There are 598 shares less of preferred stock outstanding than at the same period a year ago, these having been redeemed by the Company. An additional net amount of \$380,628 has been added to the reserve for plant depreciation, and other reserves have been built up by an additional \$277,780, which is considerably in excess of requirements.
