Loc: Their Citizenship An individual who joins the army of another country forswears his American citizenship. He must swear allegiance to the government for which he plans to fight. During the World war. American citizens who enlisted with units of the Canadian Expeditionary forces were not required to acquire citizenship in Canada. It was necessary for them to swear allegiance to his majesty, the king, for the period of their service. Persons who served in other foreign armies during the World war lost their citizenship, but could easily become repatriated by taking an oath of allegiance to the United States before any court.
