TOWN COUNCIL

The town council held a special meeting on Friday evening last. The year's budget was struck at 40 mills. Arrears of taxes are \$23,000, of which \$11,000 is for 1933.

Permission was granted by council to young men in Milton to use the basement of the committee be organized in a gymnasium.
