

MRS. C. ALLAN CELEBRATED
HER 79th BIRTHDAY

Mrs. C. Allan, who celebrated her 79th birthday on Saturday last at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Sargent, recalled many interesting incidents which took place when she was a young girl, as she swapped yarns with several of her old friends. About 40 guests were present and she received many very beautiful gifts. Mrs. H. Ramsay, of Hamilton, 83-year-old sister-in-law of Mrs. Allan, was the oldest lady present, and Judge J. W. Elliott, a cousin, was the oldest gentleman present. Mrs. Allan is the last of a family of eight. She was born in Nassagaweya and lived there 75 years, coming to Milton four years ago. Her mother and father were the pioneer settler in that district, coming from Roxborough, Scotland, in 1838. She recalls the hardships which the pioneers had to contend, and stated that the "old folks" were quite a shock if they were to see how things had changed in the last few years. Mrs. Allan still has in her possession a piece of cloth made from flax which was grown upon an acre in the old days and also a bayonet which was used in the war of 1837. Bears and wolves were abundant in the district in those days and she remembers a time when a man who was hunting was standing in front of a bear's cave and the bear put out his paw and bit the dog which was standing beside him. There was also the story about the bear which, being shot, had pulled some moss from the tree which it had climbed and closed the wound. Mrs. Allan remarked that seeing the children skating on the pond near the house reminded her of the days when she used to enjoy skating. In those days wooden skates were used. Mrs. Allan was married in 1876 and her husband died in 1888.

Upper Canada Bible Society
MILTON BRANCH

The executive of the Milton Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society desires to express its thanks and warm appreciation of the work of the twenty-four elect ladies who took part in the recent campaign for funds. To their faithful self-sacrificing efforts, persevered in day after day, often at much inconvenience, the success of the canvass is entirely due. The amount realized was composed for the most part of very small subscriptions. It totalled \$187.45. This result was less than the collect last year, when it reached \$181.05. The difference was brought about through the organization of a new society at Hornby, which has never a considerable territory formerly canvassed with good results by Milton. The funds have been duly forwarded to Toronto where they will be applied to the Society's work throughout Canada. This work to a considerable extent is along the northern boundary of settlement from east to west where population is thin and privileges are few. The work consists of visiting from time to time the far north and to practical every Indian tribe. The Society circulated in Canada last year 276401 copies of the scriptures, in 110 languages. Each of the necessary translations has been made in the face of unusual difficulties, at the expenditure of a vast amount of time and much heavy laborious work. Death of Rev. Charles T. Tough.

Galt, Dec. 11.—Rev. Chas. T. Tough, veteran United Church minister, died to-day at the age of 80 years, after spending six years in retirement. Mr. Tough, native of Bayfield, in Huron county, graduated more than 40 years ago from Knox College, Toronto, and entered the Presbyterian ministry. He was a strong advocate of church union and became a United Church minister after church union. His last charge was that of the Deacon and Metz congregation near Chatham, where he served for eight years. Mr. Tough was a prominent Mason and was widely known in Masonic circles of Galt, having been a past master of Alma Lodge, F. & A. M., and a member of the Shrine. For several years he was secretary of the Ministerial Association of Galt. Mrs. Tough, one son and one daughter survive.

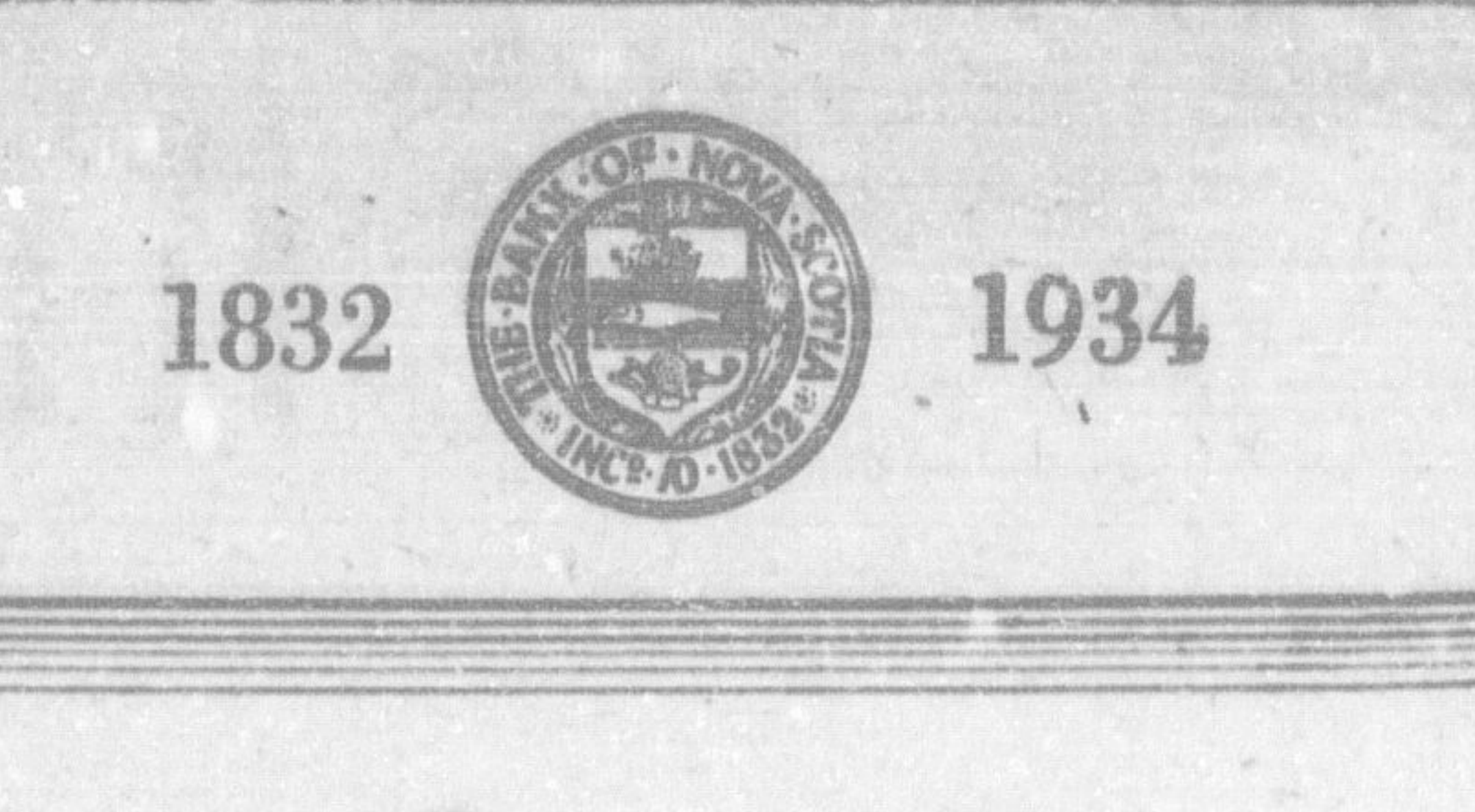

GENERAL SESSIONS.—There were no criminal cases on the docket for the general sessions here on Tuesday and Judge Munro was presented with a pair of white gloves. There were 13 petitions for naturalization dealt with, 11 of which were recommended and two reserved. In the county court George E. Elliott, acting for the plaintiff in the case of Harry Smith v. T. Bartley and Mrs. Betty Owens, asked for assessment of damages sustained by plaintiff in a motor accident. Interlocutory judgment was obtained by plaintiff on October 25. The defendant did not appear in person or by counsel. Damages were allowed at \$390, the full amount claimed, with costs fixed at \$110, including disbursements. Whether it was 200,000 tons of rock that fell at Niagara Falls last week, or some reports had it, or a mere 200 tons, as others said, there will be no general demand for a check-up of weights. People are being fined for unlicensed radios and unlicensed dogs. It's a nice question which makes the worst noise, a dog or some radios, but unfortunately the buying of a license doesn't improve either. Certain beverage-room owners talk of raising the price of bottled beer and using smaller glasses for the draught variety. Evidently, as in the days of the barroom, the liquor dispensers know how to kill the game that brings in the shekels.

Potato prices of to-day are very high, much like those of 50 years ago, but much better than in the olden days. There could have been no profit in chickens at 25c to 40c a pair. Although the weatherman has been dealing gently with us during recent weeks, provincial and county workmen are taking no chances of having to travel through bare blockaded and frozen roads. They have been busy lately erecting snow fences along highways. The six year old Holstein cow, Cedar Grove Bessie, owned by R. C. Given, Georgetown, has just completed her last lactation period under test in the 365 day division of the R. O. P. with a production of 18,091 lbs. milk, testing (average) 3.72 fat. Leta Korndyke Keyes, a two-year-old Holstein heifer, bred and owned by R. C. Given Georgetown, has just completed her first lactation period in the 365 day division of the R. O. P. with a production of 18,233 lbs. milk, testing (average) 3.72 fat. Believed to be partly due to the success of the Hon. T. B. McQuinn, minister of highways, in stamping out gasoline "bootlegging" the provincial government collected \$458,220 more in gasoline tax during November than in the same month last year.
