

With the warm weather and dates of opening of the summer hotels and resorts of the Canadian Pacific Railway will be welcom news to tourists. Banff Springs Hotel opens, June 16; Chateau Lake Louise, Emerald Lake Chalet and bungalow camps Wapta Yoho, Radium Hot Springs and Moraine Lake, June 21; French Devil's Gap Pungalow Camp. June 21; Algonquin Hotel, St. Andrews, N.B., June 29; The Pines, Digby, June 27 and the Lakeside Inn, Yarmouth, June 28.

Portland, Oregon, famous annual Rose Festival will be held this year, June 6-8. Millions of rose blooms will be on display in the many floats of the grand floral parade and also in the 47th annual show of the Portland Rose

Marking the Silver Jubilee celebrations of the coronation of King George V, to be held this year, the Canadian Pacific Railway has issued a strikingly handsome folder covering the main events of the function from the King's drive to St. Paul's Cathedral on May 6 and ending with the Lord Mayor's Show on November 9.

A beautiful new menu card for the King's Jubilee celebrations has been designed by the Canadian Pacific Railway to be used in all the company's hotels from coast to coast, on ships of the Atlantic and Pacific fleets and on world cruise ships. The whole city will be embowered in roses at that time of year.

Distracted From Pole The coast and geodetic survey says at aumerous places on the earth there are disturbances of the magnetic coadition which is normal to the region so that the compass needle is turned expected to make there. In a pmail area near Juneau, Alaska, values of declination ranging from 175 degrees west to 170 degrees east were observed where about 31 degrees 30 minutes east would be expected, and at one spot the dip was 89 degrees 59.4 inutes, and the compass needle lost Its directive property, so that the declination was indeterminate. Here the disturbing material was evidently quite near the surface and limited in extent, as the effect disappeared within a few miles of the point of maximum disturbance. At Port Snettisham, Alaska, there is an area of marked local disturbance which extends beyond the land nearly across the adjacent deep inlet. In the province of Kursk, Russia, there is a notable region of local disturbance ex-| tending for about 200 kilometers in a northwest-southeast direction.

Women Inventors While the first American invention was patented by a man, the records further state that the process was "found out by Sybille, his wife." This patent was granted by the British government to Thomas Masters for an invention for cleaning and curing Indian corn. For 19 years after the enactment of the patent law, in 1790, not a single one of the 10,000 patents issued was granted to a woman. The first successful application from a woman was recorded in 1809, and was for a method of weaving straw with silk or thread. Even for a quarter of a century afterward there were less than a score of patents granted to

Big Animal, Tiny Victim The aardvark, an animal which appears like something seen in a delirium is as ridiculous in its cating habits as it is in appearance. The full grown ant-bear as it is commonly called or earth-pig as its name translates literally, is about five feet long from tip to tail. It has a long snout and strong claws which it uses in burrowing into ant hills. Having wrecked a hill, the sardvark licks up the auts with its tongue. It seems absurd for so large an animal to feed on so small an insect, but that seems to be its main purpose in life. Its food is almost entirely insect and its habits noctuenal.

Identifying Diamonds Diamonds in the rough, as they come from the ground, may be any color, but diamonds in this state generally have a greasy luster like pieces of glass covered with vazeline. They must be cut and polished before the color and brilliance is brought but. The sparkle of the diamond is caused by the refraction of light from the facets of the diamond, and these do not appear naturally, but must be cut. It would be difficult for an amateur to distinruish a diamond as it came from the ground, and any mined product of this kind should be tosted by experts is order to determine its true value.

Seawood Yields Amber Amber, highly prized for use in jewelry, is found usually along the seashore, clinging to seaweed. It is found in large and small pleces, the largest running around 14 of 15 pounds, although one piece 18 pounds in weight is in a museum in Berlin. 
