**MRS. WILLIAM SIBBALD.**

Victoria Anne Lousley, wife of William Sibbald, Lot 13, Con. 6, Trafalgar township, died at her home on Friday last, in her 57th year. Deceased, who was highly esteemed, was a member of the United Church, Hornby, and was the wife of her husband and one daughter, Miss Eldred Sibbald, school teacher, Merriton. The funeral, which was largely attended, took place from her late residence on Sunday afternoon to the Presbyterian Church Cemetery, Hornby. Rev. B. Eyre, of Hornby, conducted the service, assisted by Rev. Mr. Kitching, of Victoria, a former pastor of deceased. During the service the male quartette of St. Paul's United Church, Milton, contributed two numbers. The floral tributes were many and beautiful.

**J. H. AMES.**

Following a few weeks' illness, James Henry Ames, resident of Milton for the past nine years, died on Tuesday night at the home of his son-in-law, Rev. Canon Nattel, in his 81st year. Born in Bromley, Kent, England, Mr. Ames came to Canada when in his second year, living his entire life in Toronto, until his retirement from business nine years ago. A well known Canadian bird collector, he presented to the Royal Ontario Museum, Toronto. He was an Anglican in religion, being confirmed by the first Bishop of Toronto, Bishop Strachan. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. L. J. R. Nattel, of Milton, and one son, U. F. Ames, Toronto.

**Trout Must Be Larger Than Sardines**

With the seizure in the last few days of 480 speckled trout, only three of which measured up to the seven-inch legal catch limit, wardens of the department of game and fisheries, under the direction of Mr. C. Nixon, have gone a long way, Queen's Park claims, toward breaking up alleged wide-scale illegal taking of fish in the Callander-North Bay district. The seizures were made from several anglers of the district in question, one man having upwards of 200 of the undersized trout in his possession when officers landed down upon him. Immediate prosecution will be launched against the offenders by the department, Deputy-Minister D. J. Taylor declared. "It's one of the worst cases of game-hogging I have ever run across, and enough to break a true sportsman's heart." The confiscated trout have been shipped to Queen's Park. Usually the department turns such seizures over to charitable institutions for consumption, but little, it is feared, can be done with these fish because of their size. All of them, Mr. Taylor stated, are last year's trout. Some of them are no bigger than sardines.

**200,000 Farm Schedules Being Distributed**

During the week commencing May 27th, 200,000 farm schedules will be distributed to the rural school teachers to the farmers in Ontario. The schedules are for the purpose of compiling agricultural statistics and the work is being carried on jointly by the Ontario department of education, the Ontario department of agriculture, and the Dominion bureau of statistics. Every effort is being put forth to have each farmer in the province fill in a survey card giving the information for his farm. The important facts ascertained from this survey are used as a basis for practically the entire body of agricultural statistics in Ontario. It is also combined with the same information for other provinces to secure Canadian totals and then sent to the International Institute of Agriculture for the preparation of world summaries. In each of the other eight provinces this farm survey will be conducted during the same week. Farmers are requested to complete the cards promptly and return to their local school teacher, who will then forward them to the Ontario department of agriculture. The cards are tabulated, and the estimates prepared as speedily as possible and released to newspapers and radio stations so that everyone may be advised of changes in crop acreages or live stock population at the same time. The results are also published in the monthly crop report of the Ontario department of agriculture, which is mailed free to any individual who requests to be placed on the mailing list. The cards are treated as absolutely confidential and used only in the statistics branch for the purpose of compiling statistics. The information on individual cards is never divulged to any one. The cards are not used in any way for taxation purposes. It is desired that farmers complete the schedule and return to the school teacher by June 4th. If any farmer does not receive a schedule he should notify the agricultural branch, Dominion bureau of statistics, Ottawa, and a card will be mailed to him. No postage is required on letters addressed to the Dominion bureau of statistics.

Even the prospects of becoming adoptive parents to help to clear up domestic misunderstandings among children, according to indications noted already in the province-wide response to Hon. David Oroll's "Adopt-A-Baby Week."

**ADOPT-A-CHILD WEEK**

This beneficent secondary effect of the campaign "Adopt-A-Baby Week" is shown graphically in one of the several applications that have streamed into the Children's Aid Society following the appeal. In this case the applicant explains to officials that she had been thinking about adopting a child for years but had been afraid to mention it to her husband fearing he would not consider doing so as thus shattering all her planning and day-dreams. But the "Adopt-A-Baby Week" led the husband himself to speak of the subject with result that the wife was at the office of the Children's Aid Society the following morning.

**ADOPT-A-CHILD WEEK**

With the appeal of childhood sweeping this province as never before in its history as the date of the adoptive parents' birthday draws near, every part of Ontario, great metropolitan centres and little hamlets, are being organized into a gigantic crusade to get all children suitable for adoption out of institutions and into the happy environment of home life. The first step in the procedure of adoption, it is pointed out by the Department of Welfare, is to call or write to the local Children's Aid Society, where an application form will be provided. After certain confidential inquiries as to the ability of the adoptive parents to look after the child, their mental and physical health and character, they will be shown all the available data regarding the children they wish to adopt. This information includes the reports of child specialists, psychologists and as much detail of the infant's background of heredity as is available. 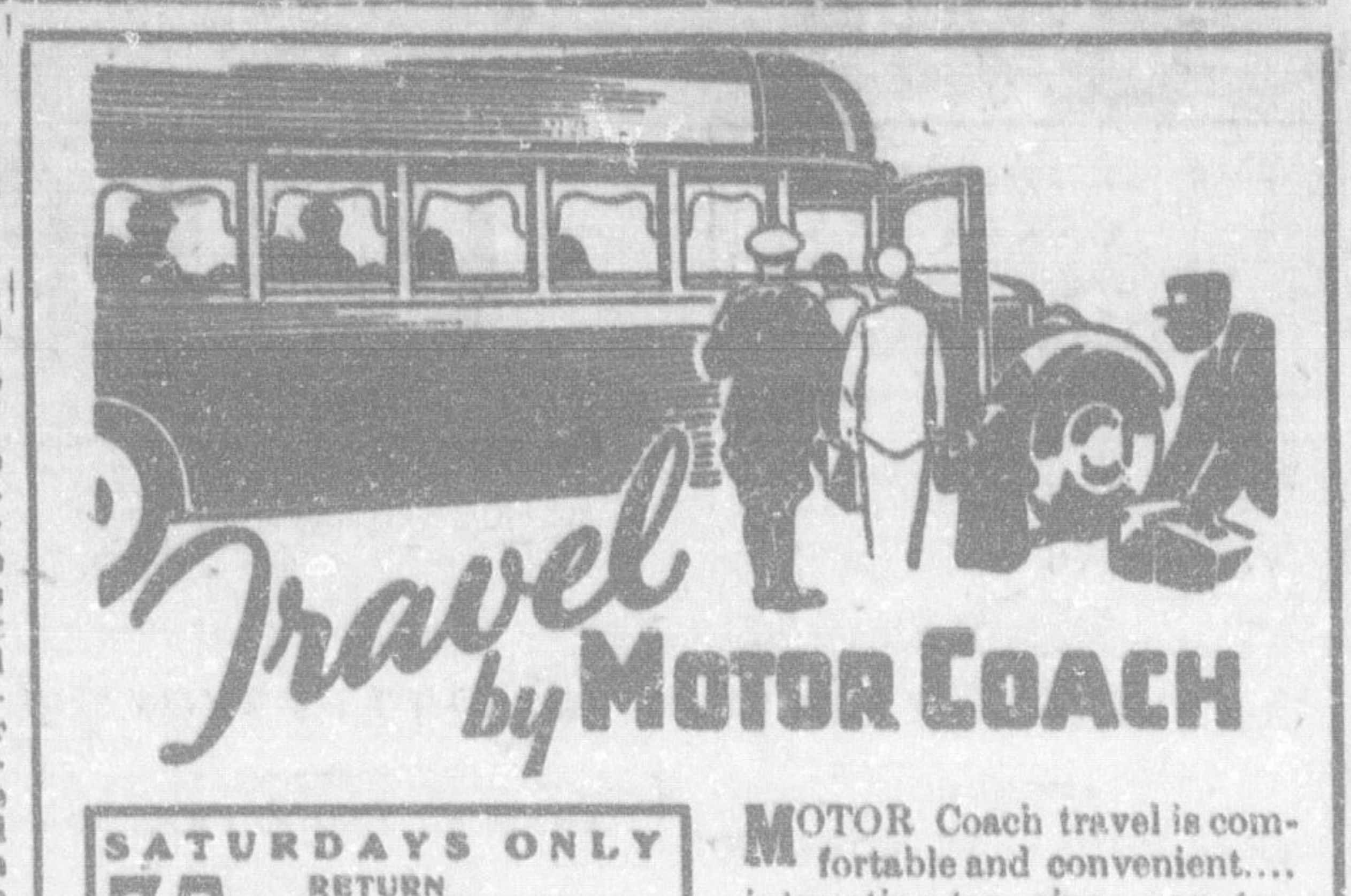
