The county council met at Milton on Tuesday, when the assessment for 1935 was equalized. After a committee of the Reeves of the municipalities had considered the matter they brought in a report that the county equalized assessment be the same as last year. The report was finally adopted, although the Reeves and Deputy-Reeves, after both speaking on the over-assessment of Trafalgar, voted against the resolution. The assessment is as follows:—

T. B. FREE AREA SUGGESTED FOR HALTON

At a largely attended and enthusiastic meeting of the Halton Live Stock Improvement Association held in Milton on Wednesday evening of last week, it was unanimously decided to go on record as in favor of the proposal to include a restricted area of T. B. Free Area. With President A. G. M. Bruyns, of Acton, in the chair the whole proposal was presented to the meeting by J. E. Whitlock, Agricultural Representative for Halton. It was pointed out by the speaker that under such a proposal compensation would be paid on all reactors, grade bulls and lumpy lumps being expected. It was also pointed out that it is only under the Restricted Area Plan of the Federal Department of Agriculture that the grade owner can secure compensation for his reactor. In addition to compensation equal to two-thirds of their value, the owner also receives their best value. It is the feeling of many of those present that grade owners would lose out on the transaction and in many cases would be financially ahead. Needless to say all milk-shippers, whether grade or pure-bred owners, with the edict of Toronto Milk District starting them in the face, are decidedly in favor of such an area. Cream shippers are of the opinion that it is only a question of time before the market will be up against a similar market regulation demanding a T. B. free herd, and therefore feel it is good business to have the test and secure compensation for reactors within a restricted area. The beef man also stands to gain from the increased demand for T. B. clean, grade and pure-bred cattle from outside buyers. That has been the experience of other Restricted Areas in the province where the cattle owners to-day are 100% solidly behind the project. In the opinion of the majority at the meeting, the question of public health is of great importance and why Halton should not pass up this opportunity. Amongst those speaking at the meeting in favor of the proposal were Reeves George Currie, of E. Quessing, Duncan Campbell, of Nassagaweya, Reeve Victor Hall, of Trafalgar, Deputy Reeve John McEwen, of Nelson, Councillor George Gordon, of Nassagaweya, and Messrs. John McCormack, Appleby, John Robertson, of Acton, Wilfred Thompson, of Hornby, and Joe Willmott, of Milton.

Rather Vague Assistance

The intimation that contracts for carrying rural mails may be let on a fairer basis is welcome. The stipulation, however, that the change will be made only if the change is very vague and little better than if it had never given consideration to the matter. For the mail carriers have been bidding against each other for these contracts until they have been paying such ridiculous amounts that equipment and labour is far from a fair wage basis. If new codes or decent wages are to be considered as part of a scheme to bring about better conditions among the working class, the Government should give first attention to this branch and institute a schedule that would pay something for this work. If ever an occupation has been the goal of the competitive or bargaining methods, it is the rural mail service. Perhaps some of the other occupations could better afford to wait adjustment if the finances of the country would permit, but certainly the rural mail carriers deserve immediate attention.—Acton Free Press

May Not Ask Tender For Mail Contracts

A bill to amend the Post Office Act will be introduced in the House of Commons by Minister of Justice Hugh Guthrie, it was disclosed last week. It will give the postmaster-general authority to renew contracts for rural mail delivery without calling for tenders. BASEBALL

The luckless Bronte team took it on the chin in a scheduled league game at the Bronte Park last Saturday, when they absorbed their fifth straight defeat. Milton fell on Gilbert and Pickard for 20 hits and outscored their opponents 19 to 5 in a game featured by two of the wildest innings we have seen in some time. Bunched blows in the fifth and ninth frames spelled Bronte's defeat.

The game, witnessed by a moderate crowd, was spotty, loose and draggy, with clever baseball coming in spasms all through. Away to a poor start and trailing 3 to 2 to the county champions put across the tying runs in their half of the second on four hits. Cam Anderson, with the base bags loaded, cleared the runway with a double to left.

Bill Gilbert, Bronte's clever twirler, was off his game and showed only flashes of his usual form. But you have to admire the youth for the amount of energy he infused into his baseball. He had the "distinction" of being knocked out of the pitcher's box twice in one game, which is something out of the ordinary. Lefty Osborne was unable to get in the game through sickness. Lowe, the hard hitting centre fielder, was also absent. A. Pickard relieved Gilbert in the fifth and Clement, the mound for Milton, had the game well in hand after the first innings, did not appear to be fully extended, and likely could have been replaced by another, but it was not necessary.

Milton players had a bat-swinging contest amongst themselves and crashed the ball hitler and you to fatten the batting averages considerably. In the hit-fest Naylor led the pack with four safeties in six times at bat. W. Clement had three hits, the rest of the team getting 13 hits among them. In the ninth inning A. Clement and Toletzka each drew two walks.

For Bronte, A. Pickard and Bray looked the best. The latter making a nice catch of G. Gilbert's long drive in the sixth. G. Pickard, on third base, missed his calling; he should have been a wrestler or rugby player. Four times he robbed Milton players of extra base hits by sensational moves and flying tackles to divert the course of the ball to other infielders.

Naylor and Sam Anderson were the stars of both teams, but we cannot overlook "Mik" Cox, the Milton bat boy. He was gathering up bats from all over the infield with a quickness and dispatch that was very pleasing. He could not be handled more lumber in an afternoon if he had been working in a saw mill.

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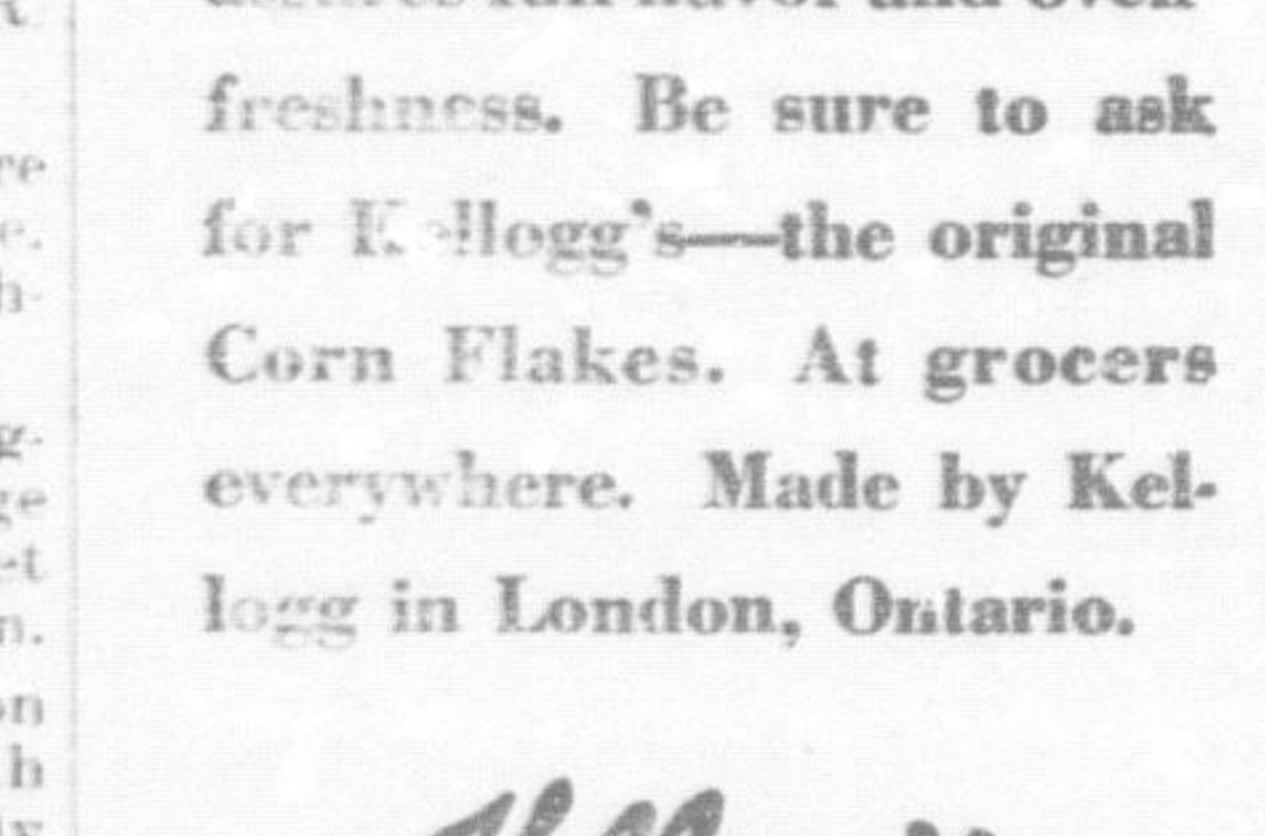
