IS IN FORCE SAYS SUPREME COURT.—The Canada Temperance Act is in force in the counties of Peel, Huron and Perth in Ontario since the present Ontario Liquor Control Act is less restricted as to the sale of intoxicating liquor than the federal statute, the supreme court of Canada ruled on Thursday last, handing down judgment in the reference on the operation of the Canada Temperance Act.
