America Once Had Queen;

Throne Room Now Empty In the Capitol building at Bonolulu where the Hawaiian legislature meets, is to be found the only throne room under the American flag. The throne stands in majestic emptiness in a room where it suggests the tragic story of a great queen who was forced to vacate it four decades ago. The queen was Liliuokalani, who abdicated a few years before the United States annexed Hawaii in 1898. She was the only queen ever to become a citizen of the United States.

Stubbornly resisting the overthrow only after she had been taken prisoner and a provisional government, under Sanford B. Dole, as president, had been set up. The queen protested to President Cleveland that United States troops had been landed to aid the revolution, and she appealed to him to restore her to her throne. Unsuccessful, she finally abdicated and, ex-queen, though she was, devoted the rest of her life to performing works that enCeared her to her people.

She composed the touching Mawalian song "Aloha Oe," heard by everyone who knows the name of Hawaii. She wrote poems. She dedicated herself to promoting education, and before she died she established a trust the income from which was to be used to found and maintain orphanages.




