WARNING TO MERCHANTS

For the protection of the public and business men, a warning has been issued that the gang of men who have victimized several people in Ontario and across the U.S. border are at present operating at points east of Toronto.

Their system is to buy money orders for small amounts, remove the protective lines with chemicals or a pen-knife, and insert additional figures to raise the orders from \$2.10 to \$20.10, or from \$25 to \$25.25. To hide these changes they have inked them over with a heavier pen. Untidy orders should arouse suspicion, the banks warn.

FIRE LOSSES DOWN

Fire losses in Canada during the week ending July 24th, 1935, are estimated by the Monetary Times at \$68,800, compared with \$292,050 during the preceding week, and \$125,200 during the corresponding week last year. Losses from Jan. 1st to July 24th totalled \$6,930,235, as compared with \$9,542,250 for the same period of last year.
