SCOUT NEWS!

Although the number of Scouts who attended the Southern Ontario Boy Scouts' two-day jamboree here was considerably less than was expected the program was a success. Owing to the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto the Boy Scouts from that district were unable to attend. On Saturday afternoon, at the agricultural grounds, Mayor George E. Elliott welcomed the officers and troops to Milton, the chief officers being: Assistant District Commissioner J. C. Hall, District Scoutmaster C. Gordon Cameron, and Field Secretary Edgar T. Jones of provincial headquarters, all of Toronto. R. B. Galbraith welcomed the boys on behalf of the Scout committee. Troops were present from Oakville, Galt, Acton and Milton.

Sports winners were: Hike, two miles, Oakville troop; knot relay race, Milton A; four-man relay race, Oakville; water-boiling contest, Oakville; tug-of-war, Milton B; obstacle race, Oakville; signaling, Milton A; cyclist race, Acton; ambulance event, Milton A; King's game, Milton B; judo, distance, Milton B; freeman's race, Milton B; individual knotting race, Milton A.

Oakville A group were adjudged the winners of the shield, which was given by the town of Milton, scoring 88 points; Milton was second with 85 points, and Milton B was third with 81 points; fourth, 2nd Oakville troop; fifth, 1st Acton troop. The shield will have to be defended for three consecutive years by the same troop before it can be retained.

The jamboree, which was greatly enjoyed by the scouts, came to a happy ending on Sunday afternoon with a parade, headed by Milton Citizens' Band, to Victoria Park, where a largely attended religious service was held. Those taking part were Rev. Canon L. J. R. Naflet, of Milton; Rev. F. A. Hill, of Campbellville, and Officers Hall and Cameron, of Toronto.

It has been unanimously decided to hold next year's jamboree in Milton, and the citizens of the town, we are sure, will again give the boys a warm welcome when they come.
