Favored Perfume Scents

Perfumes or scents preferred by English, French and Spanish people are: English, clean flower scents like lavender, heliotrope, violet; French, mixed perfumes of small flower odors, with no one predominating, but given a trade name, also lavender and thyme for household linens and lingerie, eau de cologne extensively for toilet; Spanish, heavy flower scents, as attar of roses, oil of jasmine, mimosa, mixed perfumes with basis of patchouli, amber, musk, myrrh,

Leaves Govern Apple Crop The production of apples is dependent directly upon the leaves of the apple tree, and as a rule about 40 to normal sized apple. The leaves manu facture the sugars and starches which are used in building the fruit, and if anything happens to cut down the efficiency of the leaves, the fruit will suffer in size, color, and flavor. If the tree bears more fruit than the leaves can support, then some of the fruit must be thinned.
