Besides the delta of the Po and the large marshy tracts which it forms, there exist on both sides of it extensive lagoons of salt water, generally separated from the Adriatic by narrow strips of sand. The best-known of these lagoons is the one on which Venice is situated. They formerly afforded a continuous means of internal navigation by what were called "The Seven Seas" from Ravenna to Altinum. In the days of their great fame and prosperity many fine vessels of commerce and beautiful private ships equipped in great luxury swept over their shallow waters.
