Judge J. W. Elliot Passes
 Judge J. W. Elliot died at his home here yesterday after an extended illness, in his 83rd year. He was born in Nassagaweya Township, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Elliot, pioneer settlers, and with the exception of some years at school he spent his entire life in the County of Halton. He was educated at Upper Canada College, University of Toronto, and Osgoode Hall. He commenced law practice in Milton in 1888, was made a K. C. in 1900, and in 1913 was appointed judge of Halton County. He was clerk of the session of St. Paul's United Church, a past grand superintendent of Hamilton district, R. A. M., and a past master of St. Clair Masonic Lodge, Milton. He is survived by his widow, Margaret McMaster, one son Jack of Toronto, one daughter, Miss Margaret, R. N., of Toronto, and two sisters, Mrs. John Wilkins of Milton and Mrs. Jean Campbell of Toronto.
