Justices of Peace
Put on Fee Basis
Because it caused injustice in some cases, the Ontario government has abolished the \$100 annual fee paid some justices of the peace. In its stead J. P.'s will be allowed a small fee, at the discretion of the magistrate, when they appear in court.
