VETERAN, 74, IN ORANGE PARADE.—With Milton Citizens' band heading the parade, L.O.L. No. 2885, with visiting lodges, paraded to Grace Anglican church at 11 a.m. on Sunday last. Rev. A pure white male peacock, of which there are only two in other parts of the world, was shown to the members of A. Schmalz, Preston bird fancier, at the week end. The bird evidently enjoying the large gallery of spectators, exhibited its beautiful plumage, which has a spread of nine feet. One feather alone measures five feet. The other peacock is at Millbrook.
—According to the weekly crop reports for Halton county, issued by the Ontario department of agriculture, splendid progress has been made with the hay crop during the past week. Fall wheat, while not promising a high yield, is much superior to the 1935 crop. Spring grains are looking very well, but additional rainfall is needed in most sections of the county.
Among those who received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy at the recent Convocation of Harvard University was William R. Haddock, son of Rev. Dr. Robert Haddock, formerly of Milton.
