

**Captain H. G. Scott  
Addresses Canadian Club**

The members who attended the meeting of the Canadian Club last Friday evening were rewarded with a memorable address by an outstanding scholar. The speaker, Captain H. G. Scott, has had a unique record. Born in Inverness, Scotland, he received his later education at Edinburgh University, where he took the degree of M.A. with honors in Classics and Ancient History and L.L.B. with distinction, being first prize man in International Law and Jurisprudence. It was quite fitting that His Honor, Judge Munro, should introduce the distinguished visitor, who after qualifying as a Barrister in Scotland where he practised law until the outbreak of the Great War, later engaged in legal practice in Alberta and for several years served on the Bench as a Magistrate in the city of Calgary. In introducing Capt. Scott, His Honor Judge Munro, quite fittingly referred to the splendid manner in which the speaker served his country with the Canadian Corps in Flanders, where he was permanently lamed by wounds at the battle of Mount Sorrel in 1916, thereafter offering further service to the British Intelligence Corps in Greece.

Having visited the Old Country a number of times since the war and having been in the Ruhr area of Germany during the crisis caused by the French occupation in 1923 and in Jugoslavia at the time of the proclamation of the military dictatorship in 1929, Captain Scott was well qualified to speak on the international situation in Europe.

In opening his address, the speaker referred to the trial and execution of about fourteen prominent persons in Russia, from where he returned last month. He had endeavored to discover an explanation of this tragedy, but persons who should have known did not know whether it was the result of a genuine plot to kill Stalin or an attempt to rid the country of a few Revolutionists. Some people thought that the plot had been the work of the Russian Secret Police, who created the affair in order to frighten the Government. Whether or not the confessions of those executed were obtained by promise or torture does not seem to bother the feelings of the Russian people. The executions have not created any stir in public opinion and the papers generally report the satisfaction of the people.

Captain Scott very clearly outlined a few of the chief provisions of the new Constitution, which Stalin has not only recommended but has given a limited time for acceptance. The new laws, when put in operation, will have the effect of giving to Russia the great vision of the unapproachable and mysterious Stalin. Although not generally favored by the people, who scoff at the new Constitution as a humbug, thought out to hoodwink foreign governments, Stalin believes that its introduction will mean a beneficial change for Russia.

Captain Scott took his audience on a trip through the streets of the large city of Moscow and out into the country districts so that they might have the opportunity of realizing the conditions existing in the closely populated areas and in rural districts under the present ownership. Although not generally favored by the people, who scoff at the new Constitution as a humbug, thought out to hoodwink foreign governments, Stalin believes that its introduction will mean a beneficial change for Russia.

Captain Scott painted a word picture of the re-incarnated Republic of Poland, which has been created as an aftermath of the world war. He referred to its defeats, devastations and partitioning and feelingly spoke of the unconquerable spirit of the Poles which has survived. As an example of the irrepressible Polish spirit, Capt. Scott referred to the new city of Gdynia, built on a windswept sand beach, which is located on the corridor, a post-war creation to afford the Poles an outlet to the sea. The speaker could not guarantee whether Poland and Czechoslovakia will lean toward Germany or Russia in the next crisis, but he was confident that both countries would not permit an intruding army to pass through without a struggle.

**Club Teams to Compete at Guelph**

As a reward for work well done, the Ontario Department of Agriculture has provided a programme of inter-club contests at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, on October 23rd. At these competitions teams to represent Ontario in the inter-provincial contests at the Royal Winter Fair will be selected. Last year at Guelph 84 club teams competed for the honor of representing Ontario at the Royal and this year it is expected over 100 club teams from all sections of the province will vie for honors. Halton will be represented by two dairy club teams, two grain club teams and one foal club team. The Milton, Hamilton and Guelph will be represented by Grant Heslop, Freeman, and Clarence Kingston, of Palmero, while the Halton Jersey Short-horn Club will have as its representatives Geo. Brockton, Bronte, and Gordon Hume, of Milton. In the grain club section the Georgetown club team will be composed of John Alexander and John McNaabb, both of Georgetown and the Milton Club by Ernest Pell and John McLean, of Milton. In the foal club competition, Halton will be represented by the Action Foal Club team composed of W. T. Craig Reid, of No. 2, and Wallace Swackhammer, of Acton.

**THOMAS J. BROWN.**

Thomas J. Brown, druggist, died suddenly at his home here on Friday night. A native of Tottenham, he was in his fiftieth year, and his rise in his profession was phenomenal. At the age of 19 he graduated in pharmacy with honors, and not long after became the youngest President in the history of the institution he had attended as a student. He received his degree of Pharmacy—and was for twelve years a member of its governing council. He came to Milton after practicing many years in Orangeville, and had taken a keen interest in town affairs. For six years he served on the Milton Hydro Commission, being its Chairman for four terms. A staunch Liberal, he attended St. Paul's United Church, and was a member of the I.O.O.F. and A.F. & A.M. Surviving are his widow, a son, Frank, and his father, T. E. Brown, of Shelburne. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon under Masonic auspices. A public service was held in St. Paul's United Church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. A. B. Irwin, assisted by Rev. L. Halfyard, of Tottenham, following which the remains were taken to Shelburne for burial. The floral tributes were beautiful.
