Agree Young Teachers Need Aid From Seniors

Oakville, Dec. 31 .- Do senior teachers and principals "use patience intelligence, and inspirational treatment on new teachers ?" [as] suggested by Dr. J. G. Althouse, dean of Ontario College of Education. Dr. Althouse made his suggestion in an address before the Ontario, Secondary School Teachers' Federation, where he aunouncec; a revised system of teacher training. The query was first, presented to Canon Russell Smithl chairman of the Oakville high schoo board, whose school has lost a large number of teachers in the last few years. Canon Smith replied:

"No teacher is fully qualified when graduated from college, for practical experience has to be obtained afterward. It can never be told whether a person has the ability to teach until he is placed in charge of a classroom, The new teacher has to have help from the senior teachers; principally it depends on the principal."

"As far as we are concerned at Milton we have not had to face the problems of new teachers for something like five years," said J. Marcellus, principal of Milton high school. "I've been very fortunate in that respect and therefore I have not thought of the problem in particular."

Firm Offers \$1,000 For Alleged Breach

Payment for a purported breach of contract by vacating a factory building before the expiration of a 20 year agreement, a cheque for \$1,000 was received yesterday by Acton council from the Hewetson ShoelCo., Brampton. A letter from the shoe firm stated that it had left a sprinkler system installed in the building and had also had storm windows made. 
