JAN. 15TH IS DEADLINE FOR AUTO LICENSES—Ontario motorists have until Monday, Jan. 15th, to procure the 1937 license plates for their motor cars. This was the decision arrived at on Monday last by the Ontario cabinet which met especially to decide whether a few days grace would be given.
