JOHN GEORGE LAING
John George Laing, of Milton, passed away in the Hamilton General Hospital early Friday morning, following a week's illness. Deceased was in his 80th year and had been a resident of Milton for many years, coming here from Guelph. He was a carpet weaver by trade. Surviving are his widow and two sons, John and William, at home. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon, interment being made in Evergreen Cemetery. Rev. J. N. McFall, of Knox Presbyterian Church, conducted the service.

W. H. MOORE

William Howard Moore, a resident of Brampton for the past 20 years, coming here from Milton, passed away in the Toronto General Hospital on Monday, Feb. 9th, after an extended illness. Born in Galt, he learned the barbering trade at an early age and followed this activity until he was incapacitated by failing health. He was the founder and president of the Rudi Gar Grotto Club in Brampton and was the past monarch of the Grotto. He was a member of the Ionic Lodge, A. F. and A. M. Noted for his singing, he was a member of the Grace Church choir and was associated with various choral groups. Twenty years he was a member of the Brampton public school board, having been chairman in 1929. His sole survivor is a brother, James H. Moore, of Galt, in which city the funeral took place yesterday.—Brampton Conservator.

CHARLES HENRY TURNER

Charles Henry Turner, a well known and highly respected resident of Trafalgar township, died at his home at Omagh on Saturday, February 13th, in his 70th year. Mr. Turner was born May 4th, 1861, of T. E. Loyd, a stock in the county of Middlesex, township of MacGillivray, moving to Trafalgar as a boy and attending Coyne school on 7th line. As a young man he lived on his father's farm on the base line, Trafalgar. He served in Trafalgar township council for a number of years, being reeve for two years. He lived on his farm on 2nd line, near Milton, for some years. He was a member of St. Paul's United Church, Milton, for nine years. He moved to Omagh in 1909. Mr. Turner was a director and president of the Halton Union Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance Company. He was a member of Omagh Presbyterian Church from 1909 until, serving as elder and superintendent of Sunday school; since Union he was a member and an elder of Bethel United Church. He is survived by his widow, two sons and two daughters, Gordon, of Montreal, and Morris, of Palermo; Miss Abbie Turner, and Mrs. George Brownridge, both at home; nine grandchildren; the eldest son, Howard, died six years ago. Also surviving are his two sisters and a brother, Mrs. Abbie Sailer and Mrs. Ida Hall, both of Hamilton, and David Turner, of Trafalgar township. The funeral, which was largely attended, was held on Tuesday afternoon, interment being made in Evergreen Cemetery, Milton. The service was conducted by the Rev. B. Eyre, of Horby, assisted by Revs. J. W. Booth, of Canilla, and B. F. Andrew, Mansewood.

Halton Seed Fair For Georgetown

The second annual Halton Seed Fair will be held at Georgetown on March 12 and 13, states President T. J. Brownridge. This event is sponsored by the Acton, Requeing and County of Halton Agricultural Societies and primarily is for the purpose of bringing together those who have seed grain for sale and those who are looking for seed grain and small seeds of good commercial quality. Seed grain is going to be a scarce article in Halton this spring, states Mr. Brownridge, and therefore those having surplus seed produced in 1935 or 1936 would be well advised to get it cleaned and graded in time for the Seed Show. This event which was instituted for the first time last year was largely attended and the committee anticipates that there will be an even larger turnout for the programme on the afternoon of the second day, which includes addresses by Dr. C. J. Christie, of Guelph, and E. J. Navis, Provincial Forester. We understand that the annual Junior Farmer Judging Competitions in seeds, fruit and vegetables and cream grading will be held in conjunction with the Seed Show on the morning of Saturday, March 13.

INFANTILE SPINAL PARALYSIS

Mr. Years ago, post mortem upon the bodies of two victims of infantile spinal paralysis at Johns Hopkins hospital, showed the presence of a vegetable mould in every case. The mould develops in cooked vegetables, principally potatoes, that is kept over for a day or more. The mould gave no indication of its presence by either taste or smell, but in the case of potatoes, they become "sticky" and were unfit for use. This view accounts for its season occurrence, in the early spring and fall months. During the hot weather, housewives know that cooked vegetables are liable to spoil, and in winter the danger does not exist. The onset of the disease begins with high temperature and offensive bowel discharges, followed by muscular weakness, finally ending in paralysis. Early and efficient treatment of the bowel condition usually means rapid and complete recovery. Its prevention can be secured by cooking just sufficient vegetables for that day only. A. S. Township Councils to Supply Warble Powder

The warble campaign, initiated by the Halton Livestock Improvement Association in 1935, is being continued for the third year. A canvass has been made of all cattle owners in the county in order to ascertain additional powder requirements. All four township councils at the February sessions decided to purchase the additional powder required. Cattle-owners generally are enthusiastic over the results secured, some of the key-men going so far as to state that there has been a decrease of 90 per cent. in the two years. Officers and directors of the association hope that all cattle-owners will again cooperate so that this costly pest can be entirely eliminated.
