Let us make it an infallible rule to dip or dim our lights when meeting other cars. It will soon become almost automatic for us to do so. Oncoming drivers will respond. Within a very short time, this "deliberate gesture" of Courtesy (as it now is) will become a

Do not crowd the other Fellow when meeting or passing. If he is inclined to be a nervous driver, he may easily misjudge distance at night. We don't know. And it costs us nothing to give him several feet of clearance.

Let us give pedestrians MORE than ample space for walking. We have all the advantage when we are driving and the other fellow is afoot. Let us not use that advantage in a bullying way.

On the other hand, when we are walking, let us show true courtesy to those who are driving. When we walk WITH traffic, we place ALL the responsibility upon the motorist. Always walk facing oncoming traffic, and wear or carry something light that the lights of oncoming cars will pick up, even if you carry only a partly opened newspaper.

These are a few instances only, to demonstrate the SPIRIT of Courtesy which I am suggesting and * recommending to the people of Ontario.

Practise and preach the golden rule of the road "Show to others the same courtesy that you would like to have shown to you".



Wood and Cotton Supply Material for Cellulose

Celiulose is the fibrous matrial that acts as a sort of skeleton for all plant life. Its most pientiful source, wood, is about one-half cellulose. Cotton, its purest source, contains over 90 per cent of it, relates Thomas M. Beck if the Chicago Tribune.

The uses of cellulose are widely vaflax, ramie, jute, sisal, and hemp (but not wool nor silk, which are proteins), "Oscar says my follow through is kinds. "Endemic," "Indigenous"

The terms "endemic," "indigenous" especially in biological usage, are synonymous. One botanist, for instance, may describe a tree as "Indigenous in California"; and another referring to the same tree, may say it is "endemic in California," There is a tendency from the medical view to limit the use of endemic to the resultant of conditions distinctly local, but not necessarily irremovable; as the bubonic plague is endemic in India, but (probably) is removable by the extermination of the rats. Whereas indigenous would indicate the resultant of irremovable conditions, as, say, of climate. -Literary Digest

Fear May Cause Disease

In certain types of persons, emotion al disturbances such as intense fear sometimes cause gastric ulcers and toxic golter, writes Elizabeth Switzer, Oxford, Ohio, in Coilier's Weekly. And in dogs, sound alone, such as that of a trumpet, is known to produce changes in the blood count, particularly an increase in the bacteria-killing leucocytes, when previous sounds of the trumpet have been accompanied by injections of antitoxin.

Orchid, Gardenia Not Mentioned

The orchid and gardenia, popular modern floral gifts, observes the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, are not even mentioned in the dictionary of flowers, where a tulip signifies infidelity, the arbutus "inseparable love," wild balsam "impatience" and barberry branch "ill temper." The blue bell is "constancy," the cornflower "delicacy," the cowslip "winning grace," the daffodil "unrequited love," and the dandelion "coquetry."

National Dish of Scotland The haggis is composed principally of sheep's liver, beef suet and minced onions mixed with oatmeal finely ground and toasted slowly until it is light brown. All this is seasoned with cayenne, salt and black pepper and mixed to a pudding consistency with beef gravy or broth. The mixture is then sewed into a sheep's stomach and boiled slowly for three hours. It is served very hot without garnish.

Peace Conference of 1861

In January, 1861, the legislature of Virginia passed a resolution inviting the states to appoint delegates to meet at Washington to consider an adjustment of the national difficulties then pending. This conference met February 4 and adjourned February 27. Twenty-one states were represented. As a result of its deliberations, a constitutional amendment was proposed which prohibited slavery north of the parallel of 36 degrees 30 minutes northern latitude; south of this line it was to exist without restraint. It denied the right of passing laws giving freedom trade. The amendment was brought
