The door was on the latch in this home, for they knew the medicine that so often cured this suffering one, could not always balk the tomb.

In this farm home sabbath morning, Came a gentle voice divine, And said unto this patient sufferer, Lay your feeble hand in mine. All your pain on earth is ended, Lay your cares, and burdens down, For your room in heaven is ready, You must come and wear your crown. Then she folded her hands meekly, Spoke with friends on earth no more, Went to join the waiting army, Beckoning from the other shore.

In the beautiful Bethel church where she loved to worship, friends from Hamilton, Toronto, Brampton, Dundas and the surrounding country came to pay their last tribute of respect to her who was loved by every one who knew her. And she was beside the saints joining in that hymn of praise. Then when the congregation were singing the hymns she always loved so much, in our imagination we could see her beside the saints at the river in that choir around the throne.

Do our loved ones way up yonder, Gather 'round sometimes to ponder, Do they often muse and wonder, Was their life work all a blunder, When the storms of life are blowing, Blighting good seeds they were sowing, They know loved ones, left behind them, Sometimes, somewhere, prayers will find them, When the minister with praises ringing, And choir and congregation singing, We know our loved one now in glory, Still repeats the old, old story.

The first link in the Featherston home was broken and the husband, one daughter, Irma, school teacher in Welland, one son teaching at Kitchener, three sons at home, one brother in California, and one on the Ford homestead, are left to mourn the loss of a faithful wife, mother and sister. Carlyle and Ralph, the two youngest sons, were unable to attend the funeral on account of shock. Their Pentecostal friends from Hamilton and Brother and Sister, Crowsberry, were present at the church service.

Members of Palm Family Form an Odd Collection

The various members of the palm family form an odd collection. Some are dwarf, but a foot or two high; others tower aloft 100 feet. Many, nearly all, are of single columnar shafts, but some are freely branched and others consist of many stems, rivaling the bamboos in this respect. Some have both sexes on the same plant, others differ in sex. Some flower and fruit annually, to a grand old age. Others make a large growth without flowering and then, in a supreme and life-crowning effort, put forth a flower stem 30 feet high, and perish from exhaustion.

There are palms that have tiny fan-shaped leaves a few inches across; others enjoy leaves many feet in diameter. Some have tiny ostrich-plum leaves, and some give rise to fern-shaped fronds 30 feet long. Some trunks are dwarf or entirely absent, while climbing rattan palms have lengthy trunks.

Certain palm seeds are less in size than a grain of wheat, and there are others with coconuts, or with the "double coconut," a fruit never seen here, states a writer in the Los Angeles Times. The latter hails from the Seychelles islands and weighs fifty pounds. It is so large that it requires several years to grow and mature. Usually palms perfect their seeds in one season, as do nearly all plants. A few pines and oaks are exceptions to this rule.

Death-Spray Too Dangerous
Fears that arsenic dust sprayed from airplanes to combat the great locust plague in South Africa would bring death to big game and domestic cattle have proved to be only too well grounded, according to reports reaching the British Society for the Preservation of the Fauna of the Empire. Preliminary experiments had indicated that the danger would be small. Experience has shown, however, that the poison clouds have not only been fatal to animals but to large numbers of insectivorous birds, particularly the migrant European stork. "This picture," the society's journal says, "alters the whole aspect of the supposed efficacy of the method, for the army of insectivorous birds inhabiting the regions invaded by locusts would in any year undoubtedly destroy more locusts than are poisoned by arsenic."
