Brian Ambler complained that the frontage of his 95-acres in Moffat was improperly zoned. He said about half was zoned open-space conservation hazard lands) while most of the rest was zoned both A2 (agriculture) and environmentally sensitive.

Open-space conservation land requires the approval of a conservation authority prior to building. Usually this is because the land is subject to some vagary of nature, such as flooding, from time to time.

Although Mr. Ambler didn't object strenuously to the OSC-zoned land, he said the label environmentally sensitive "effectively prevents me from building on my land"

Mr. Singer didn't agree with that assumption although he said he had roubles accepting the label.

Town planner Bob Zsadanyi said, after the meeting that the label is needed by Halton Region to conform with its official plan. He said that before Mr. Ambler could build on land deemed environmentally sensitive several studies, including a drainage analysis, would be needed.

Another complaint involved John Karemko, who said wording in the lylaw allows building on lots which front only on maintained roads. His 50 acre parcel fronts on No. 3 Sideroad west of Guelph Line. At that point, the road is merely a dirt path and hasn't been maintained for at

least 20 years However, Mr. Yaremko said he had

no intention of building on those lots, the largest of which is a natural woodlot. He said he has applied to the Magara Escarpment Commission to change the boundaries of the lots from north-south to east-west. He said he intends to donate the largest portion of the land, effectively the woodlot, to the Ontario Heritage Foundation. He would then take the lot which borders on Second Line and create five two-acre lots.

However, the plan requires NEC approval, which hasn't yet been received It has been approved by the Town of Milton and Halton Region. ar Yaremko said he was objecting to the Town's bylaw because if his plan doesn't receive NEC approval, he would be prohibited from building on his parcel of land.

The NEC decision has been reached but it awaits approval from the provincial minister. That is expected oon.


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Masked ball is arts council's pick me up


