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
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

Trendsetters are featured

Canadian fashion designers and a collection of international designer garments will be featured at the "Fashion Trendsetters of the Century" seminar to be held at Sheridan College's Oakville Campus Thursday, January 16, 1986.

Presented by Sheridan's School of Fashion Arts and Conference Centre, the event will include two day-time seminars for high school and college fashion students and a gala evening affair open to the public and the fashion industry.

Participants will have the opportunity to see the wide world of fashion and rub shoulders with the Canadian designers.

A collection of 12 original international designer garments which are housed in the Fashion Institute of Technology's design lab in New York City will be on display. The collection includes designs by Coco

Chanel, Bill Blass, Adrian, Dior, Rabamme and Balenciaga. Rose Simon, a curator at FIT, will discuss the collection at the evening seminar. Seminar organizer Patricia Gwyer, co-

ordinator of the Fashion Technique and Design Program at Sheridan (School of Fashion Arts, Oakville Campus), said the event will be an eye-opener for students and fashion enthusiasts. Rebecca Armstrong, co-ordinator of

Sheridan's Visual Merchandising Arts Program, will set up the display of Canadian designer clothing.

The seminars and display will also serve as a launch for Sheridan's new costume museum. Among the garments in the collection are designs by Ruth Dukas and Emilio Pucci.

Ms. Gwyer said the museum will become invaluable to future students.

"Many high school students who come to Sheridan have never seen designer clothing up close.

'This will allow them to view the work of designers and map fashion trends." Tickets for the 10:30 a.m. and 2 p.m. stu-
