Both Halton Regional Police and the OPP have noticed a marked change in attitude of the people they pulled over during their armual spotcheck programs. Numbers are not down significantly from last year but this is likely caused by the newness of the stricter laws.

During the month of December 1984, through blitzes and normal patrols, Milton OPP stopped 1,029 paired driving and handed-out 16

1,217 cars, laid 16 impaired charges and 12 suspensions. In all of 1984, 142 charged with impaired.

Halton Regional Police stopped 2,565 cars in Milton, and Halton Hills throughout December, in spot-checks and regular patrols. Only 10 people were charged with over 80 mgs or impaired. For December in all of Halton region, they stopped 7,838 drivers, and laid 29 impaired charges, but only in spot checks.

In December 1984, 63 drivers were charged with impaired driving available but Sgt. Garry Bogue, of the Halton Regional Traffic Division. estimates this year's figure to be slightly lower than last year's

'The new laws have definitely had an effect," said Sgt. Bogue. "We are getting a lot of feedback.

"Our enforcement is up," said OPP Constable Bruce McArthur, "That's why our numbers have stayed relatively the same. I think that next year our numbers are going to be way down though."

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Bell Canada says . . .

'Free' calls would cost more

The possibility of direct dialing to Toronto from Milton may be just around the corner. However, users should expect their basic residential rate to jump to about \$19 per month for that privilege.

Long a complaint among local users, "free" service currently extends only to Oakville, Burlington and Acton with many areas in the Town of Milton outside local dialing.

Bell Canada spokesman Denise Grey explained to members of Millon council Monday that it's cheaper for most Miltonians to keep the present. service than pay the higher rate and include Toronto.

She said about 66 per cent of Milton and Campbellville exchange users place long-distance calls to Toronto monthly. Of that total, only 17 per cent would save money by having direct dialing.

However, she said the criteria for extending the service to Toronto, should it be passed by the Canadian Radio and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC), would enable Miltonians to get it should a majority apply for it. However, all users would pay

the additional cost. She said rates for Milton businesses would jump from \$29.10 to \$64.55 per month. In Campbellville, rates would rise to \$23.20 (from \$9.15) for residential phones and \$74 (\$32.10) for businesses. They would be among the highest rates in the province.

She said a complete survey would be undertaken, should it be requested, of telephone users with a majority required for the changeover

High costs, she said, was the reason for keeping the service as it is. She said including the area in Milton served by the Rockwood and Guelph exchanges would cost \$850,000 to include into the Acton exchange.

She also said the cost for aligning Bell's traditional boundaries with those of Halton Region would cost \$5.8 million. In addition, combining the Campbellville and Milton exchanges would cost several hundred thousand dollars, although she didn't give an exact figure.
