

# Georgetown is pumped up for Remax A bants

Georgetown has been flat all year, but they're pumped in the playoffs. And Milton's Remax bantam A Hockey reps know it.

Winless over the regular season, Georgetown is putting Milton through a tough and surprising best-of-five series Thursday on Milton's home ice. Georgetown beat Milton 3-2 Saturday in Georgetown, Milton turned the tables, coming up with a 3-0 shutout.

But in game three at Memorial Arena Sunday, Milton had to dig deep to come up with a 4-3 win. Georgetown pulled their goalie in the last minute of play and scored to make it touch and go to the buzzer.

And while Milton is the odds-on favourite for the series, it has proved costly to them. "We lost one of our top scorers," coach Ray McRobbie explained. "Mike Brooks got out with a broken wrist." That happened in the second period of the first game of the series.

Brooks is expected to be out for several weeks, which may be the remainder of the crucial playoff rounds in Milton. Game four of the series was slated for last night (Tuesday) in Georgetown. Results were not available at press time.

Georgetown put Milton on the defensive in the early going of the first game. They scored the only goal of the opening period and added another in the second stanza. Milton replied before the flood, with sharpshooter Andrew Champagne, a consistent scorer, putting Milton on the board. Brooks and Scott Melee assisted.

Milton knotted the score in the third period. Jeff Closs and Sean Riley combined to set up John Dobbie's goal. But Georgetown came back and

won the game with two seconds remaining. A slapshot from the top of the slot was the difference.

Milton netminder Brent Currie earned his fourth shutout of the season (his first in the playoffs) Saturday in the opposition's barn. Currie came up with the same kind of solid performance that earned him a paltry 1.88 goals against average over the regular season.

Remax popped one in the opening period and padded the margin of victory with two more in the middle scrimmage. Melee got Milton's first late in the opening period. He beat the Georgetown netminder with a corner sneak from behind the net.

Cory Wilyman and Jan Spagnuolo provided Milton's insurance policy in the second period. Melee, Scott Chariton and Sean Riley collected assists.

Georgetown took the early lead in the crucial third contest, but Remax controlled most of the middle period and enough of the third to win.

Jamie Pearson put Milton on the scoresheet, assisted by Brett Elliott and Jim Flemming. But Georgetown came back to score twice and make it 2-1 at the end of the first.

Milton struck back with two goals. Spagnuolo and Flemming pulled the trigger, following hard work from their counterparts.

Champagne dug the puck out of the corner and lined a pass to Spagnuolo in the slot, and Spagnuolo quickly converted it. Late in the period, coming off shifts of penalty-killing, Milton went up by one. Elliott hit the crossbar but Flemming shovelled in the rebound to make it 3-2 Milton.

Riley put Milton up by two in the third period, with the assist going to Flemming. But Georgetown took the

game to the wire, scoring the extra-man goal with 38 seconds remaining.

## Wounded back, midgets winning

With the return of the walking (or limping) wounded, as well as the bolstering presence of Geoff Pollen, McCuaig Insurance minor midgets are in the driver's seat in their best-of-five series with Brampton. Milton leads the series two games to none. And McCuaig has not been in trouble in either game.

Grant Thomson and Darryl Hebert, as well as Pollen (back from the junior B ranks) have swelled Milton's roster. Also, Max Henriksen and Chris McRobbie have improved consistently. That coupled with steady play from the rest has provided Milton with 5-2 and 6-2 wins over Brampton.

Scott Hilson has been on a scoring tear, slamming a hat trick in the opening game and cashing for two goals and three assists in the second contest. Pollen scored twice in the opening game and once in the second, and added an assist in each skirmish.

Rob Wilson was a pivotal playmaker, with a goal and three assists in the second game. Wayne Rivers and Doug Drennan provided the other Milton goals.

Scott Ellwood, Rivers, Travis Cole, Hebert and Wilson collected assists in game one.

Game three in the series is scheduled for tonight (Wednesday) at Memorial Arena. Game time is 7 p.m.

## Diet Centre wins but not by much

It began as a best-of-five series. It became a best-of-three series. And it

Going into the last game of the atom A first-round playoff hockey series between Milton and Streetsville, it was even money who would emerge on top. But that changed in the final contest.

Sunday in Streetsville, Milton's Diet Centre Atom A reps ended the series with the only one-sided victory in the elimination round, taking the game to Streetsville for a 5-1 win.

Duane Swift and Scott MacDonald each collected two assists, helping out on Hull's goals. Doober and Chesla assisted on Gillies' goal. Craig Power put in a strong performance in the Milton net.

Streetsville had bounced back into the struggle in the second game by scoring the winning goal 16 seconds before the 10-minute overtime period

ended. Following a scoreless first period Streetsville got on the board with a blast from the point that eluded Craig Power. Milton battled back to tie the score with six seconds remaining in the second period. Gillies made it a stalemate, assisted by Fred Van Zutphen and Doober.

Streetsville sprinted into the lead

again with a third-period breakaway goal, but Milton knotted it again with five minutes to go. Hull scored, assisted by Danny Ewing and Gillies.

In the crucial fourth game of the series, Diet Centre found it difficult earning the 4-3 overtime win. Milton was behind 2-0 after the first period and 3-1 after two.

Bill 77 was recently passed by the Ontario Legislature, setting a 4% rent review guideline for any rent increase since August 1, 1985 for private rental units occupied prior to January 1st, 1976.

This guideline applies unless the Residential Tenancy Commission approves a higher increase.
