

Students in Grades 6, 7, and 8 submitted projects ranging in subject matter from hydroponics to natipolish durability to thermal balance.

There were more than 200 entries in the annual event and several were intricate. The only stipulation of Grade 6 students was that they had to build something with at least one of these parts; a lever, a pulley, a screw, a wheel and axle, or an incline plane. The Grade 7 and 8 students were limited only by their imaginations.

Science fairs began as a way to spark an interest in science, even in students who may not have been that keen in the past.


