New president for Fair Board

Milton Fall Fair Board has a new president. Jim Livock, of Sixth Line, Oakville, was named to the position at the annual meeting of Halton Agricultural Society. He has been an active director of the local fall fair for the past eight years.

He succeeds Jim McPhail, of Georgetown, who has been president for the past two years and active with the fair as an exhibitor and a director for 38 years.

The 1985 fair set records for attendance and gate receipts, as well as entries in most categories. Gate

receipts accounted for \$43,900 of the total income of \$158,400. Grants accounted for \$19,900; entry fees \$5,138; and rentals of the grounds and buildings \$29,200.

The fair paid \$31,300 in prize money. The major expense in 1985 was a new display barn in the infield. built at a cost of \$32,800.

Dates for the 1986 fair were established for the fourth weekend of September, Sept. 26-28.
