

# Cagers want northern title

## Sports Shorts

With two wins in their last two games of the middle school basketball season, Sam Sherratt School entered the north Halton semi-finals on a roll, but it could have been a better roll.

Sherratt played in the north Halton semi-finals Tuesday afternoon at home against Centennial (results not available at press time), and as the second-place finishers in the north Halton league were hoping to advance to Thursday's north Halton finals at Milton District High School.

In their last two league games, Sherratt downed Georgetown's Centennial 52-37 and squeaked by Brookville 30-21.

In other action, Georgetown's Holy Cross bowed out against visiting William Phry in the championship final of the Sherratt tournament. Phry downed one of the area's top team's 32-20.

In the consolation championship, Sherratt squared off against Stewarttown for the third time this season and lost a nail-biter 30-28.

Stewarttown jumped to a quick 10-point lead but some clutch shooting by Ken Trickey got Sherratt back into the game. The score was knotted at the half. Sherratt again fell behind by 10 but rallied to put the issue in doubt during the dying minutes of the game.

With two minutes to go, Sherratt got clutch baskets from Chris Van Zuylen and Chris Cheevers. They closed to within two points. Eric Devine, Dean Campbell, Glen Trickey, Sandeep Sharma and Todd Mulley contributed to the late rally.

Milton defeated Centennial handily, jumping to a 24-0 lead before the opposition found their footing. Jake Birch scored 16 points for the winners as their game clicked with solid team play and a high level of aggressiveness.

Thursday's game in Brookville was not a classic, Milton coach Gary Southworth said. But it was a win. Jeff Van Zuylen and Trickey were strong contributors to the win.

Saturday, Milton travelled to the Holy Cross tournament with an undermanned squad of eight players. Sherratt dropped their first two games, losing 31-20 to Holy Rosary and 28-22 to St. Francis. Milton rallied to beat Holy Cross 30-26.

Sherratt posted an overall record of 10 wins and eight losses as of Monday evening. They had been defeated in the consolation finals of two tournaments and finished second in another.

### YBA named co-champs

The Milton YBA junior basketball team was named co-champion of an eight-team tournament in Scarborough on the weekend.

After each club won its first two games, Milton and North York were deadlocked at 10-10 after regulation time in the championship game. Tournament officials decided to declare co-champions rather than holding overtime in keeping with the fair-play concept of the Youth Basketball Association.

Mark Lawrence, Pat Gleeson and Trevor Fleet were instrumental for Milton in the final game. Fleet and Lawrence paced the defensive play while Gleeson, who scored the opening basket and the game-tying basket, controlled the offensive tempo.

North York, which averaged 30 points in its first two games, was clearly out-hustled and out-rebounded by the smaller Milton team.

In the opening game of the tourney, Milton whalloped Scarborough 34-2. Judy Rideout, Darnell Urban, Nick Varricchio, Tiffany Scobie, Garth Moore and Trevor Kuhn led the offence.

Milton followed that up with a 9-3 win over Toronto Central YMCA in a game which wasn't as close as the score indicated. Michael DeWolfe and Bonnie Van Slyke played well while Gleeson scored three points.

In league action Wednesday, Milton and Speyside played to a 20-20 deadlock to keep the Milton team's unblemished record alive. Darnell Erskine, Rafie Nagui and Kyle Hadley were effective on defence while Tom Rofthouse and Andrew Skinner helped quarterback the defence.

In other recent action both Milton YBA junior teams earned wins against Mississauga YMCA teams.

Milton Whites defeated one Mississauga team 38-6 while Milton Reds downed a second Mississauga squad 30-10.

The Whites' offence was led by Pat Gleeson, Mark Lawrence and Darnell Urban. Andrew Skinner, Rafie Nagui and Tommy Rofthouse had excellent defensive games.

The Reds' offence revolved around Garth Moore, Steve Flemming and Nick Varricchio. Brian DeWolfe, Kyle Hadley, Michael Meek, Darrell Erskine and Martin Pyle played well defensively.

### Ski club comes close

Milton Heights Ski Club's Alpine White came as close as any of the four Milton teams was going to get to the circuit's final competition, but even Alpine White was not close enough.

Alpine White posted the top Milton result, finishing second at the recent semi-final qualifiers. Only the top team in each category advances.

Alpine White's strong finish was bolstered by Jasper Martin's fourth-place finish. Teammates Pete West and Alex Franknow were fifth and 10th respectively. Dana Williams was 10th for Milton Heights in girls competition, while Anya Pederson was 12th and Leanne Williams 13th. Milton had 345 team points to winner Devil's Elbow's 424.

The Milton Alpine Red and Mountain Dew teams finished third in their divisions. Mountain Dew had 341 team points to front-runner Caledon Red's 464. Alpine Red had 287 to Mansfield's 494-point finish.
