Both Howie Scannell and John Morgan have announced their intenshare. When they have covered their participation in the club. That will mean profit. ve Turner and co-owner Mark renier, perhaps, holding the bag. Grenier returned from Florida

Monday and was apparently undecided about whether or not he would Turner returned from Mexico on

e weekend, to find that following vo weeks of deliberation neither forgan or Scannell had budged from positions they indicated they ould take at a meeting just prior to urner's Mexico trip.

Turner said he will buy Morgan's share of the team. And that if need be he would buy the entire team.

"I've owned this much, (his and Morgan's shares, 50 per cent) of it before." As for Scannell's share, Turner added, "I imagine Mark (Grenier) will take it. But I haven't talked to anyone. I really didn't know for sure (until returning from Mexico) where Howie stood." Asked if he would take sole ownership of the franchise he replied, "if I had to I would."

Morgan confirmed that Turner will take his piece of the team. "I have virtually committed to selling my share to Grant. But there are no details yet. We haven't decided on a settlement."

While Morgan is committed to selling to Turner, he said he would have rather sold the entire team to an outside interest. "As you know, there was an outside offer to buy the team this year. I would presume that offer is still good."

This was in reference to Brad Grant's initiatives. Grant, the owner of Sandstone Transport, had made initial overtures to buy the franchise around Christmas but negotiations fell through. Grant said Sunday he would not buy the team unless he could acquire the entire operation, and Turner has repeatedly stated that he will not sell.

A source within the club indicated that each of the four owners will probably have to cover a \$2,000 shortfall when all is said and done this season That, the source said, would be approximately the difference in gate receipts from the previous season.
