### When plaza opens Parking a problem

A potential lack of parking when Carriage Square opens on Main St. is one of the main problems the Milton Downtown Business Improvment Area (DBIA) merchants are squarling to face.

At the DBIA annual general meeting, the discussion on parking lasted for almost an hour. There were many complaints about parking and as many solutions.

Currently the plan will be to encourage employees of the shops at Carriage Square to park elsewhere than the plaza lot. This may result in

Several merchants said they are angry that some merchants park on Main St. all day. This leaves shoppers to find a spot away from the street. The idea of increased monitoring of cars was suggested; and the spectre of parking meters also was raised.

The next meetings of the DBIA will delve into finding a parking solution said DBIA chairman Bruce Hood.

### Carriage Square to go glossy with magazine promotions

Glossy magazines with timely editorial content will be one of the main promotional items used by Carriage Square to bring shoppers to the new Main St. plaza and encourage shopping generally downtown.

So says, Patrick Pardoe, of Patrick Anthony Consultants, the guest speaker at the general annual meeting of the Milton Downtown Business Imprevement Area (DBIA). He said the glossy magazines - which he called "maglogs" - have worked well for other malls such as Clover-

dale, Meadowvale Towne Centre, and the Shipp Centre.

Mr. Pardoe, who joined the Carriage Square team only one week before the DBIA meeting, said residents will enjoy the advertising approach of the plaza.

He was asked if members of the DBIA would be allowed into the maglogs. Mr. Pardoe didn't dismiss the idea and said it might be possible to include Main St. merchants.

He said Carriage Square intends to co-ordinate advertising with the DBIA.

The most important change in-Martin St. Public works director John Matthews has suggested a solution to the problem which causes a bottleneck now:

It starts May 26-31 with the theme "Downtown Milton Welcomes Carriage Square". In conjunction with the opening of the downtown mall, there will be a banner at Quality Greens, balloons in the trees, and horse and buggy rides to the new town hall.

In June, a Moonlight Madness sales will be held with street closing and dance. On July 26 comes Mid-Summer Kids Day with the downtown set aside for the entertainment of children with clowns, mimes, puppet show, balloons, face painting, finger painting, a pet parade and carnival

On Aug. 16 and Sept. 13, the Farmers' Market will move to Main

Lastly, extended hours will begin Dec. 15 for Christmas shopping.

In a report on road conditions, Mr. Matthews said Milton had 219.5 km of roads in 1980 and the adequacy of

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
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
