# Memorial held for Al Nicholls

Former students of E.C. Drury High -School will remember Al Nicholls most for the faith that he had in all of them and his dream for an integrated campus.

Mr. Nicholls, who died Feb. 27, at the age of 59, was remembered in a recent memorial service at E. C. Drury. He was that school's first prin-

His career began in 1949, and spanned more than 30 years before his retirement 1983. It was imto him that he always be involved in some way with students and teachers, and he managed that

through his entire

He started as a teacher at Oakville-Trafalgar High School in 1949. From there he moved to T.A. Blakelock and assumed the position of Head of Physical Education. When White Oaks High School opened in Oakville, Mr. Nicholls moved there to become that school's first vice-principal.

In 1969 he was promoted to Assistant Superintendent. His sincerity and ability to make the most complicated ideas simple won him the respect of his fellow administrators.

"Al was aware of issues, listened

well to all sides of a situation, and weighed the alternatives," said Moe Pennock, principal of E.C. Drury, in

his speech at the memorial service. "He made realistic priorities in concert with his staff and encouraged staff and students to carry out the school priorities with his support."

Staff and former students of Mr. Nicholls had an opportunity to reflect on the man during the memorial service. Some of the things that they remembered most strongly about the

couragement helped to create a uni-que learning environment.

His sense of humour was Mr. Nicholls trademark. "I never get mad. I only get even," was a popular response of his when students and teachers played practical jokes on

Mr. Nicholls ability to make a fair decision, and rejuvenate and redirect student's energies towards their goal were other qualities of the man which came up at the service.

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


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
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
