The differences and polemics of Halton's four municipalities are best shown when local groups appeal to the region after their funds have been terminated.

At regional council, several groups were on hand to appeal the cutback or cutoff of funding following deliberations made by social services committee recently which was trying to stick to a 4 per cent guideline.

Health and social serivces chairman Peter Arch urged council to stick to its 4-per-cent ceiling, an inflationary guideline from which the committee rarely veered during the funding debates. Halton agree to allocate \$522,000 to social service groups this year and has done so to the penny, he said. No more, he urged, should be spent.

Milton mayor Gord Krantz was asked by Burlington mayor Roly Bird, why Milton town council will not locally fund the Milton Human Services Centre (MHSC). Mr. Krantz replied, "because I'm not one of those bleeding hearts.

Mr. Krantz agreed with Mr. Bird that the MHSC should not seek regional funding, but neither should the Royal Botanical Gardens in Burlington which gets a substantial Halton boost.

"That's a completely different thing," said Burlington councillor Walter Mulkewich.

Saying his committee would support a one-time start-up grant for MHSC if the Milton council offers support, Mr. Arch took exception to Mr. Krantz's suggestion that the committee is comprised of "bleeding hearts."

"That's tough," Mr. Krantz retorted prompting a second complaint from Mr. Arch as to parliamen-


