
Two crime nights left

Policedeclare war on Rotary

Outdoor partyers have gotten a jump on the drinking season this year.

Staff Sgt. Roy Teague reports that in 1985 the bulk of liquor out of residence offences were handed out to drinkers during the summer months of June and July. Rotary Park was the most popular party site.

But this year police have already been kept busy with offenders drinking at the park.

'We have noticed an increase with the good weather, " said the Staff Sgt. "We plan to make a concerted effort to prevent a recurrence of the problem that was experienced last year."

Police have received complaints from residents living near Rotary Park about the noise, and the fire department has had to respond to a number of fire calls there.

"There has already been some damage done to town property. There have been some fires set and picnic tables were used as fuel."

Staff Sgt. Teague says police will be taking a hard line towards out of residence drinkers over the upcoming months. A first-time offender can expect a hefty fine of \$53, but repeat offenders will be summoned to appear in court where they could face stiffer penalties.

He adds that anyone charged with damaging property with fire will automatically have to appear before a judge.

Last year in one threemonth blitz, police nabbed 16 repeat offenders in the area of Rotary Park.

"We will be stepping up our enforcement of the park area in an effort to eradicate the problem and rid neighbouring residents of a major source of aggravation."

Rebuilding Ontario St. cost \$5 million

A \$5-million redevelopment of Ontario Street will widen it to four lanes from Derry Rd. to Steeles Ave., should a preliminary

report receive approval. The widening of the road, part of the Highway-25 route through Milton, has been slated for some time. An open house in

December produced many comments from residents.

Another open house will be held next Thursday (April 24) at Halton Centennial Manor from 2-5 p.m. and 7-9 p.m. Residents are invited to give their comments on the proposed scheme.

The plan calls for major redevelopment of three intersections and the widening of two sections of the street to four lanes. The combination of the two developments should significantly facilitate traffic movement through the town, the report said. Over the past half-dozen years, localized

construction has widened parts of the road to four lanes. Those areas are from Laurier Ave. to Derry Rd.; south of Main St. to Wakefield; and north of Main St. through the railway overpass.


