Carnation sales aid MS research

Close to \$2,500 was raised in Milton Saturday for the Multiple Sclerosis Society.

The funds came from the sale of 3,000 fresh carnations as well as mini bouquets and boutonnières. Barb Saxby, local campaign organizer, said volunteers sold all of the flowers they had from locations at the beer and liquor stores, Milton Mall and Canadian Tire.

We did really well. We were really pleased and it certainly was a suc-

cess," Mrs. Saxby said of the campaign.

Carnation Day is an annual event for the MS Society, coinciding with Mother's Day for which carnations are a symbol. Donations contribute to MS research.

This was the first year Mrs. Saxby headed the campaign. Employed by the MS Society as a patient services co-ordinator, she was asked by a patient who usually organizes the local fund drive, to take over this year.

Paul Tonkin was out of the country during this year's campaign. Next year he and Mrs. Saxby will combine their efforts in the fund drive.

The 11 volunteers who sold flowers on Saturday enjoyed the task, according to the organizer. She agreed that offering the fund-raising blossoms in return for donations was attractive to people. There was no set price given to the flowers but those who purchased them were asked for a \$2 "preferred donation."

Town faces doubling of insurance

The cost of insuring the Town of Milton for the next year will cost 90 per cent more.

Although coverage has been changed in some areas, the total premium Milton will pay this year to Frank Cowan Company Ltd. is \$133,333, up from \$70,000 for the previous 12 months.

"There's not much we can do about it," said Mayor Gord Krantz, "but say 'oh, gosh' it could have gone higher."

Town treasurer Jim McQueen said the insurance company paid or expects to pay about \$24,000 in claims involving Milton over the calendar year 1985.

There are increases in all three main areas of insurance. Accident and crime insurance jumps 45 per cent to \$4,318 (\$2,980 last year); physical assets insurance rises 34 per cent to \$39,805 (\$29,605); while third-party liability goes up 80 per cent to \$81,518 (\$45,338). The basic total rises from \$70,000 to \$124,641.

In addition, councillors approved increasing the deductible from \$1,000 to \$2,500 which results in a tax saving of almost \$11,000.

However, Mr. McQueen recommended increased third-party liability coverage from \$5 million to \$7 million which added \$12,198 to the bill.

The final significant change to the insurance coverage was a requirement from the provincial government that all municipalities have environmental protection coverage in the famous Spills Bill.

Councillor Brian Penman said he was concerned the extent of coverage wasn't sufficient or extensive enough. "It's a bitter spill to swallow," he said.

Coverage would allow for a maximum of \$1 million on any single claim to an aggregate total of \$2 million.

Halton Board votes against booze in groceries - stores

If the Halton Board of Education has anything to do with it, beer and liquor will not be sold in grocery stores.

The trustees carried a motion, which originated from the Association of Large School Boards in Ontario, at Thursday night's meeting.

The motion, which was put forth by Milton trustee Bill Harrison, is in support of the Ontario School Trustees' Council petition directed toward the

Premier of Ontario, and the Minister of Consumer and Commercial Relations instructing them not to proceed with the proposal that beer and wine be sold in grocery stores.

Trustees voted based on the rationale that the more accessible alcohol is to teenagers the more likely they are to drink during and after school hours.

The Halton board became a member of ALSBO earlier this year.

Funds spark a row

The suggestion to re-establish Halton Board of Education reserve funds sparked some heated discussion at Thursday's meeting.

Reserve funds are just a way of soaking the taxpayer for a rainy day," said Oakville trustee Jim Clelland. "It is not really fiscal planning. There should be nothing artificial set aside because we will just spend it anyway."

Milton trustee Bill Harrison presented the reserve fund recommendation for information. It is set to be voted on at the next meeting.

Jerry Jenkins, Superintendent of

Business Services, said the Halton board had a 1985 reserve fund of \$600,000. That surplus was used when the mill rate was being set to keep the increase down. The board spent more than \$1 million to cover interest charges last year.

"I don't believe the board has practised enough discretion in the past, so reserve funds won't add to the savings in the long run," said Mr. Clelland.

Oakville-trustee Janis Milman said that reserve funds would be a good idea. "It would be like setting up a cushion."

as it applies to persons in possession of land within the Town of Halton Hills.

Unless noxious weeds are destroyed by May 26th, 1986, and as often as necessary throughout the season to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their pollen, the Town of Halton Hills may enter private property and destroy these weeds. The costs will be charged against the property owner and collected in the manner of Municipal Taxes.

Goatsbeard, Thistles, Chicory, Poison Ivy, Ragweed, Wild Carrot and Milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding Dandelion and Goldenrod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of the Weed Control Act.

Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.
