Being 15 is an emotional rollercoaster ride under the best of circumstances.

But when the welcome mat has vanished from your parents' doorstep and your new address is a shelter for teens in transition, even a potential winner can start to feel like a loser.

The self-image of such an adolescent can be shattered - and it may take years to put the pieces back together again.

The extent of the emotional breakage depends to a large degree on how long the welcome mat is removed and how much positive reinforcement the teen receives from friends, professionals and the community at large.

Take the case of Leigh (not her real name). She's been living at a Halton CAS shelter for nearly two months, not knowing where - or with whom - she'll be living tomorrow. The only thing she does know is that it won't be with her own family - at least not until many problems have been resolv-

Leigh's self-esteem is at a low point and it's becoming difficult for her to relate closely to other people.

Like most 15-year-old girls, Leigh enjoys rock music and is eager to be popular among her peers. At the same time, she is described as responsible, good with children and pets. Her favorite subject is English.

Social worker Ian Thompson says Leigh has a lot going for her, and that the right provisional foster home could help the girl turn her life

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
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
