Oilers took on the hosts in the opener and came out on top thanks to goals from Donny Smulders and Danny Medlar. Scott MacDonald earned "a well- deserved shut-out," McLean

Milton ran up against Wexford next, and a combination of a flat Milton showing and what Mclean called "brilliant" play by Wexford earned Wexford a 7-0 win.

Milton dominated play in the first half against Hamilton Croatia, but couldn't score a goal. The game was some sharp Milton midfield work. Mark Wild and Tim Shier passed the ball well and when called upon the Oiler defence of Luke Doering, Mike Glidden, Todd Dowell, Barry Cason and Jason Penman played effective-
