

Appreciate your seniors by enjoying their week

By the end of the week, senior citizens should be more aware of services provided for them in their communities.

This is the aim of Seniors Awareness Week which concludes Saturday. Milton Mall will be the location of informative displays, entertainment and a drop-in for senior citizens. The region-wide awareness program was developed in reaction to a study of services for seniors which indicated a need for promoting them.

According to Val O'Hara, chairman of the region's Elderly Services Advisory Committee, the information will be of interest to residents with aging parents as well as the elderly themselves. There will be suggestion boxes at each awareness week display throughout the region. General information booths will be manned by volunteers who will be able to answer questions and make referrals.

Among the subjects to be covered are housing, transportation, recreational and social programs and services related to health, home nursing, home support and counselling. More than 40 agencies will be represented, with several setting up individual displays. Activities will centre around the drop-in located in a vacant store near Loblaws. The entertainment begins today (Wednesday) with movies geared to seniors being presented by Milton Public Library. They will be shown at 10:30 a.m., 1:30 and 3:30 p.m. at the drop-in. Thurs-

day afternoon the Milton Senior Citizens Orchestra will perform beginning at 2 p.m. That evening there will be a bingo game running from 7-8:30 in the drop-in.

There will be another bingo game Friday morning at 10 a.m. Senior Citizen Club 88 will be supplying the manpower, the mall has donated the cards and markers and mall merchants are supplying prizes. Music will again be in the air Friday afternoon when the Milton Seniors Choir entertains from 2-4 p.m. Friday evening the Scotch Block Squares will be dancing at 7 p.m. with their act being followed by the Madrigal Singers, a contingent of the Milton Choristers.

Mrs. O'Hara said that in addition to making seniors and their families more aware of services available, people should also get the idea that the elderly population is growing. The involvement of seniors in the events will demonstrate "that a lot of seniors are well and active."

"The numbers of unwell seniors are in the minority," she explained.

Where the minority is concerned, she hopes members of the community realize they have a shared responsibility with families of seniors, in respect to their care. Many services offered rely on volunteer support, she said.

Halton's gun ban now a compromise

A compromise on the Halton agreement forest hunting ban has been suggested to regional councillors who will review that decision today (Wednesday) at council.

The task force set up Jan. 22 has suggested that instead of a total ban, hunting in the region's 14 agreement forests be limited to the same period of time the Ministry of Natural Resources extends to deer hunting.

But, during that normal time of mid-October to mid-December, only bows and arrows will be allowed. There will be a four-day exception.

That is the four days when the Ministry conducts a deer hunt in Halton. During those four days (and those four days only) shotguns can be used. The use of firearms for whatever purpose other than those four days will be totally banned.

In her report to regional planning and public works committee which approved the report last week, task force chairwoman, Pam Sheldon said "it is felt this compromised situation, from a total ban on hunting, will address the concerns of the agricultural industry as it related to crop damage caused by deer. It will reduce the incidents of trespass by hunters leaving the agreement forests and entering into private land. And it also addresses the concerns of other recreational users of the agreement forests with respect to the danger which may be presented by hunters."

Mrs. Sheldon noted the task force was not unanimous on the final agreement it accepted but "it is generally felt that this is the best possible compromise considering the initial, polarized positions taken by the various groups."

The public in Milton will still have a chance to comment on the compromise before it is entered into bylaw form by the regional council.

Residents are invited to attend a public meeting Wednesday, July 2 at 7 p.m. in the regional council building on Bronte Rd. At that time, a joint meeting of the hunting ban task force and the planning and public works committee will take place to receive public input on the recommendations.

Three trustees coming in fall

The Halton separate school board will get up to three new trustees who will have exclusive rights over the board's French language schools when Bill 75 becomes law this fall.

There are three French separate schools in Halton serving 731 students.

According to the proposed Bill, parents will have a right to have their children educated in a French school if they are Canadian citizens whose first language learned and understood is French.

When Bill 75 becomes law, parents who have children attending French language school will be entitled to elect French trustees to the separate school board to govern these schools.
