The practice swing


Most of you can say - and with justification - that your practice swing is better than you actual swing. The practice swing is usually smoother, better paced, and finished in better balance.

believe there is a psychological barrier imposed as soon as the ball is placed in front of the average player. The hit impulse takes over. During the practice swing the player will accelerate beautifully through the imaginary ball. There is no contact with the ball and therefore nothing to fear.

My old friend Moe Norman says there are two key words to describe what goes on in a golfer's mind just before he swings. Hope and fear. I hope I hit it but I am afraid I won't.

You can use your practice swing to rid yourself of this phobia. You must reverse your thinking. In golf, the most important thing is the swing. Make a good golf swing and let the ball get in the way. Don't try to make the club get in the way of the ball.

A famous golf instructor was



giving a lesson one day and the pupil was chopping and slashing and digging holes in the turf. The teacher stopped him and said,

"Take a practice swing and show me how you would like to swing:" The student made a near perfect practice swing.

"I would like to swing like that but I can't," he said. It is really a question of ignor-

ing the hft impulse. Duplicate your best practice swing and just let the ball get in the way.

During your range practice, take a couple of practice swings between each shot. Make your actual shot with the same tempo. It won't be long before the two swings resemble each other.
