Obituary

'Babe' Clements

Friends, family and several firefighters from the Milton Fire Department and neighbouring vicinities attended the funeral of Albert E. Clement at the Grace Anglican Church Monday.

Mr. Clement, 75, better known to his friends as Babe, passed away last Thursday while vacationing in Las Vegas.

He was born in Milton in 1911 and is best known for his 44 years of dedicated service to the Milton Fire Department.

Mr. Clement began with the department as a volunteer firefighter in 1934. In 1951 he assumed the role of volunteer fire chief. He served in that post until 1963 when he became full-time fire chief.

While serving as a volunteer firefighter, Mr. Clement worked at the Model Knitting Mills at Main and Commercial streets, then for the Town at their Sewage Disposal Plant, until he became full-time fire chief. Over the years he had been honoured for his service to the department. He was awarded the Centennial Medal, Provincial Medal, Queens Ascension to the Throne Medal, and was most recently honoured for more than 40 years as a firefighter.

Mr. Clement had seen the department go through many changes over the years, and was instrumental in bringing about some of them. He had a hand in organizing the mutual aid fire system in Halton County, served as past president of the Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs, and as chairman of the Milton Firefighters Club and Halton County Fire Prevention Committee.

He was a graduate of the Ontario Fire College.

The fire department was only one of Mr. Clement's interests. He was a member of the St. Clair Masonic Lodge.

Baseball was one of his first loves. He played for years for the Milton Red Sox, the senior baseball team, with his brothers, Kenneth "Dick".

CAO selected today

Halton Region is expected to announce the name of its new Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) today (Wednesday) at regional council.

The person who becomes the region's top civil servant will have been selected from a short list of five people, one of whom was known to be current treasurer Joe Rinaldo.

The successful candidate will be paid between \$60,225-\$70,850. The job became vacant when Dennis Perlin, a regional solicitor who was appointed CAO during the regional deficit.

Halton divided . . .

Riding redistribution results in major changes . . . into four ridings

Voters throughout Milton will be part of two different provincial ridings as a result of redistribution throughout Ontario. The Bill was passed last Thursday.

Halton will now have four ridings, instead of the existing three. Most of Milton will remain in one riding - Halton North - which includes all of Halton north of Derry Rd. Peel Region to the east and Hamilton-Wentworth Region to the west are its north-south boundaries.

The current Halton-Burlington riding, which includes all of Milton, stretches from north Halton to north Burlington.

The municipalities of Oakville and

Burlington, with Bronte Rd. and the Queen Elizabeth Way as the dividing lines, make up their own ridings.

The fourth riding - Halton Centre - is comprised of Halton from the QEW to Derry Rd.

Halton-Burlington MPP Don Knight said he lobbied to have almost all of Milton included in the one riding. The original plan divided Halton on a north-south basis putting Miltonians into a variety of ridings. This way, he said, most Miltonians remained in the one riding.

The riding of Halton-Burlington contains a population of almost 100,000 people. The new riding of

Halton North has a population of about 60,000.

Mr. Knight said he expected subdivision growth in Halton Centre might require that riding to be eventually split. The subdivisions of Glen

Abbey (Oakville) and Headon Forest (Burlington) are found in Halton Centre.

The changes will take place in time for the next election, expected in 1987.

Snow Parkway officially closed

More than three months after the fact, regional council has "officially" closed James Snow Parkway until the highway interchange is rebuilt.

This move was made last Wednesday at Regional council and officially closes that portion of the overpass roadway from Steeles Ave. to the north end of the overpass; and from Main St. to the end of the roadway at the south end of the overpass.

Although both sections have been

closed by barricades, fencing and signs, it had not been officially declared closed to the public.

By passing a bylaw officially closing the roadway, fines and penalties can be imposed on any person who without lawful authority goes on the closed section of the overpass.

This also lets the region (which controls the roadway leading up to the overpass) to be absolved of liability should someone be injured.
