

It's crowded in middle of MFL

As a result of games played last week only four points separate second through fifth place in the Milton Flag Football League.

Only first-place Re/Max Realty and last-place Halton Pools seem secure in their present positions, while Bruce Hood Travel, the Charles Hotel, Banvil Fans and the Dickens scramble for the other postings.

Games played saw Re/Max Realty defeat Banvil Fans 24-18, the Charles hammer Hood Travel 36-1 and the Dickens paste Halton Pools 41-14.

In game one Re/Max Realty got two touchdowns from Hector Campbell and one from Gary Kennedy on an interception return. But it was the toe of quarterback Ray Delegrade that decided the issue. He came through with three converts and a field goal to make the difference. Kim Bishop added two interceptions for Re/Max.

Gary Lesnicki took care of all Banvil scoring with a big three-touchdown game, although none of the majors were converted. Larry Beaulieu added one interception.

The Charles Hotel turned a 12-1 halftime lead into a 36-1 rout against Hood Travel. Touchdowns were spread among Norm Flemington with two, including one on an interception return. Peter Daly, Howard Mott,

Larry Berringer and Don Campbell. None of the scores were converted. Quarterback Kevin Prendergast grabbed one interception to get his name in the paper.

For Hood Travel it was a case of former "Wonder Boy" Werner Mikolet undergoing the old sophomore jinx at pivot. The Hood team was unable to muster much offence. A Steve Leachman punt single put their only point on the board while Dave "Tiger" Williams came up with one interception. John Matwijczyn had the best pass of the game, after personally pulling Mikolet. On his first toss he connected perfectly with the Charles' Norm Flemington for his interception return.

In game three the Dickens stayed hot with a 41-14 trouncing of Halton Pools. Dickens quarterback Rick Goodings hit Tom Silcock for two majors and connected with Doug Ranch and Dom Lepre for singles. Ranch added a second touchdown on an interception return early in the game, and, not to be outdone, so did Rob Young a few plays later. Silcock added three one-point converts and Ranch chipped in with a two-pointer while Lepre also intercepted.

Halton Pool scoring came on touchdowns by Dave Sweetland and Mike Hobson (remember him?). Peter Hohman added a two-point con-

version, but that was all she wrote for the pool people.

The 13-year-old Milton athlete was second in the under 16 3000 metre race at the Royal Canadian Legion Provincial Track and Field Meet. She finished in 10:41, close to but not a personal best.

In under 16 1500 metre racing Guzman was third.

Julie Armstrong, 16, won both events. Armstrong's best time is but one second off the Canadian age group record at 3000 metres.

But, noted Jennifer's father and trainer Omar Guzman, "Nobody but Jennifer will be there (in under 16) next year."

Omar Guzman also pointed out that Jennifer "raced in a vacuum." That is, while she had no hope of catching Armstrong, no one else had any hope of catching her.

The young athlete's father said he hopes his daughter's training is on schedule for next week's Ontario Track and Field Association championships in Burlington.

"We're close to the personal bests we had earlier at the Colgate Games," he pointed out.
