# Saw suspicious auto, Constable held two alone waiting for backup

Constable Brenda Glass has been off the regular patrol beat since September 1985, and working as a director of educational police videos. But that didn't stop her from making an arrest earlier this year which netted more than \$1,000 worth of stolen property and led to solving 14 different crimes.

Cst. Glass, 27, was off-duty from her position in the Halton Regional Police Training Bureau, early Monday March 24, when she noticed a suspicious looking vehicle in the parking lot of a Burlington apartment complex.

She made note of the vehicle's licence plate.

"Moments later I saw the car drive into the underground parking lot," said Cst. Glass. "I drove through the

lot to ascertain what was going on, when I came upon the car in a parking spot. I pulled up behind it, but couldn't see anyone in the car."

She grabbed her flashlight and police identification and cautiously moved toward the darkened car.

"I saw two fellows lying down on the front seat. I knocked on the window and identified myself as a police officer. They wouldn't roll down the window."

After some fast talking she convinced the two young men, aged 16 and 19, to open the car. She noticed several tools in the back.

She then took the driver of the vehicle back to her own car, where she questioned him.

"I got lots of information from him. I found out who they were, where they were from. I let them know that I was aware of what they were up to, and that if they attempted to run they would find themselves in deeper trou-

Without access to a radio or telephone, Cst. Glass had to figure out how she was going to get some help.

Since last September she has been working in the force's video training




