When Lester and Barbara Wood moved to Milton in 1972, they wanted an activity that their three daughters could participate in and meet new friends with. The only organized sports in the town were hockey and

skating. Then, with the excitement of the 1972 Olympic Games and Olga Korbut, gymnastics became popular and Joan Boothby started a gymnastics club in Milton the following year. The Woods enrolled their daughters Suzanne, Kerry and Melanie in the club, at various ages, and from there, grew a commitment and dedication to the sport that is still strong years

The club rule was that parents had to volunteer at meets and other activities, from time to time, and the Woods readily agreed. Suzanne, their eldest daughter now 21, began gymnastics at age 8 and continued for nine years. She was the strongest in gymnastics and went to the provincial championships three times, winning a silver medal in the vault competition

By 1974. Mr. Woodewas the president of the Halton Gym Club and acting head coach in 1976, while Mrs. Wood was the registrar of the gym club and then acting co-head coach as well. In 1977, Janet Campbell was hired as head coach of the club.

We are not really professional coaches, and so we decided to hire someone who was trained in this field' said Mrs. Wood. "Janet graduated from York University in Physical Education and is really qualified."

"It's really time consuming but really enjoy the work I do. he said. It takes up about 12 hours per week for me, and Barbara has meetings two nights a month as the Milton Spr ingers' representative to the central region.

Although there are 16 competitive

gymnasts who belong to the club, the Springers are always looking for new members. Boys are a rarity, not only in the Milton club, but in Ontario, as are coaches to train them.

We have a recreational program for boys gymnastics, but so far there is no one qualfifed to coach them. said Mrs. Wood. "It's really a shame because there are some boys who would love to learn more about the

"It has been hard to find a qualified boys' coach because most of the talented coaches are working for universities although there has been some interest peaking lately," said Mr. Wood

As for their future in gymnastics, Mr. Wood has one more active year as president of the OGF and Mrs. Wood has agreed to represent the Springers for another year. After that, they will re-assess the situation.

We have been involved for a long time, and have really enjoyed it, but our children are grown and we want to move on to something else," said Mr Wood


