**Videotaping:
Region Police project
has proven worth in court**

The two-year pilot Halton Police Interview Project (TIP) began in July 1985. Since that date, all interviews at the Burlington police station have been videotaped. All other Halton stations have relied on the traditional pen and notebook method of taking statements.

"We are delighted with the continuing success of this project," said Gilles Letourneau, commission vice-president, in an issued statement. "While it is too soon to draw any firm conclusions, we are encouraged by the positive initial results of this field trial."

"At this point we are very pleased with TIP," said Halton Regional Police Sgt. Norm Ryall, a co-ordinator of the project. "There have been no major problems so far."

Before the project was started police were concerned about the legalities of their procedures because the concept was so new. "We had to be certain that we weren't infringing on anyone's rights," said Sgt. Ryall. "We had to take all the proper safeguards but we couldn't be assured of success until we passed the test in court."

Sgt. Ryall said the response from both prosecuting and defence counsels has been mainly positive. He says the videotapes present an accurate account of what was said, Human error in taking, and misquoting are eliminated.

"Defence counsel is not too crazy about how their clients appear on tape though. Most of them don't look like they do when they show up for court," said the sergeant.

In a report issued by the Law Reform Commission the project was evaluated. Some of the positive aspects included:

- The videotaping has not inhibited suspects from making confessions or admissions on camera. Of those interviewed on videotape, 73 per cent made admissions or confessions.
- Crown counsel has indicated there are no problems in having the tape introduced into evidence in the cases that have reached court.

In some instances, the case has not reached a contested trial because defence counsel has entered a guilty plea after viewing the tape.

The videotaping process has saved court time in cases where defence counsel has waived the voir dire - a hearing to determine whether the confession is voluntary - after viewing the tape outside of the court.

Sgt. Ryall says there is no significant difference between the number of admissions and confessions being received during videotaping and the standard method of interviews. He adds that the biggest plus of the TIP project is the court time that it saves.

Defence lawyers agree

Defence lawyers in Halton approve of an experimental program involving videotaping the questioning of suspects.

This is contained in comments by York University law professor Alan Grant in a report on the program. He said the lawyers prefer the video system saying it is more accurate than taking notes.

The two-year Halton police experiment is being done with the assistance of the Law Reform Commission of Canada. The concept was conceived by Halton police. According to Mr. Grant, it is

already seen that court time has been saved.

Using the taped interviews there have been less voir dres (a voir dire is when a judge decides if hear-say evidence is relevant to a trial).

The videos easily show whether any coercion was used during an interview.

However the jury is still out on whether the videotaped interviews foster a greater percentage of confessions or speed them up.

Nevertheless Halton's experiment has generated a lot of interest in the police community.
