Homemade Christmas crafts made by experts in their field will be on sale at the second annual Campbellville Country Christmas sale. The three-day event begins Friday, Nov. 28 and ends Sunday, Nov. 30 with every shop in the village participating in the Christmas extravaganza.

Antique shops will be open for those to purchase or browse and artisans such as rug makers, hand weavers, woodworkers and a goldsmith will give demonstrations and have crafts for sale.

"Everyone participates and this is sort of an introduction to Christmas," said organizer Dorrie Murdoch-Greig. "Our regular customers like it and it's a chance for those who don't come here on a regular basis, to shop and get to know us."

Computer link to emerging business

The Milton Chamber of Commerce became part of a new computer system to put investors in touch with emerging Ontario businesses on Monday.

Called Computerized Ontario Investment Network (COIN), the system is being promoted by the Ontario Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with the Milton Chamber and 159 other chambers of commerce making up the new network. The Ontario chamber will play an active role in promoting and distributing information brochures and registration forms on the system. It is seen as Canada's first centralized matchmaking service for investors and entrepreneurs.

Research shows that small and emerging businesses, particularly in small centres, often have extreme difficulty finding sources of equity capital, said Bernard Wilson, president of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce.

By the same token, there are large pools of venture capital in Canada, but there has never been an effective way of funneling these funds to businesses in need of support, said Mr. Wilson who is also a senior partner in the firm of Price Waterhouse.

The current system of matching entrepreneurs with investors interested in participating in their ventures is a hit-and-miss process relying on accident and chance, he said. COIN will fill that gap by acting as a centralized intermediary.

COIN will do much more promoting the Milton Chamber to get involved. COIN will allow Milton to expand beyond its current dimensions or definition. It will also enable new services, new products, diversification, expansion and development to mushroom within the town's boundaries, said Milton Chamber administrator John Lawrence.

COIN, he said, will reach out and strengthen the Milton business community and stimulate business activity.

It cost \$250 for an investor and \$150 for an entrepreneur to be involved.
