The Milton Chamber of Commerce became part of a new computer system to put investors in touch with emerging Ontario businesses on Monday.

Called Computerized Ontario Investment Network (COIN), the system is being promoted by the Ontario Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with the Milton Chamber and 159 other chambers of commerce making up the new network.

The Ontario chamber will play an active role in promoting and distributing information, brochures and registration forms on the system. It is seen as Canada's first centralized matchmaking service. for investors and entrepreneurs


