

Beeline's Brad Jenkins has hot hockey hand

When you're hot you're hot. Centre Brad Jenkins had a hot hand last week, scoring six times in two games against Ancaster.

As a result, Milton Beeline Transport twice A hockey reps picked up three of a possible four points, winning their first game 7-3 Wednesday and settling for a 4-4 tie Sunday at Memorial Arena.

In the first contest, Ancaster opened the scoring early in the second period. But just 19 seconds later, Corey Bourgon slapped the puck into the net on passes from Brad Jenkins and Joey Rodrigues.

Ancaster came back two minutes later to take the lead, but Eric Medeiros set up Darren Pemberton to tie it again. Pemberton slipped the puck between the goalie's pads to earn the tying goal.

Jenkins tallied twice in the span of one minute to put Milton ahead 4-3 with 1:39 remaining in the period. Rodrigues assisted on both goals, with Bourgon assisting on the fourth Milton goal.

Ancaster made it interesting, scoring 18 seconds later to cut Milton's lead to one going into the third period. But Milton pulled away with three unanswered goals in the third frame.

Adam Johnson led the way, scoring on a high shot at 1:07 elapsed of the period. Greg Yantz assisted on the play.

Jenkins put the game away with two quick goals at the midway point of the period. Rodrigues capped a fine performance with his fourth assist of the game while Bourgon collected two assists, and Jason Gaffney added one.

Following the game, Milton coach Fred Sharer said, "it was a good game, with the team playing to its potential, which was indicated by the score."

In Sunday's rematch at Memorial Arena, Ancaster rallied from a two-goal third-period deficit and Beeline's had to settle for a 4-4 draw.

Ancaster opened the scoring on a breakaway with 1:49 elapsed in the first period. Milton came back with two goals in 53 seconds. Cameron Davies jammed the puck under the goalie's pads to tie the score and Brad Jenkins scored to put Beeline's in the lead.

Ancaster scored the only goal of the second period.

Again, Milton rallied with two quick goals. Beeline's appeared ready to chalk up another victory.

Bourgon put Milton in the lead on a pass from Jenkins, and 36 seconds later Jenkins quickly shot gave Milton a two-goal margin. Bourgon and Rodrigues assisted on the goal.

Ancaster battled back, scoring twice late in the period to earn the draw.

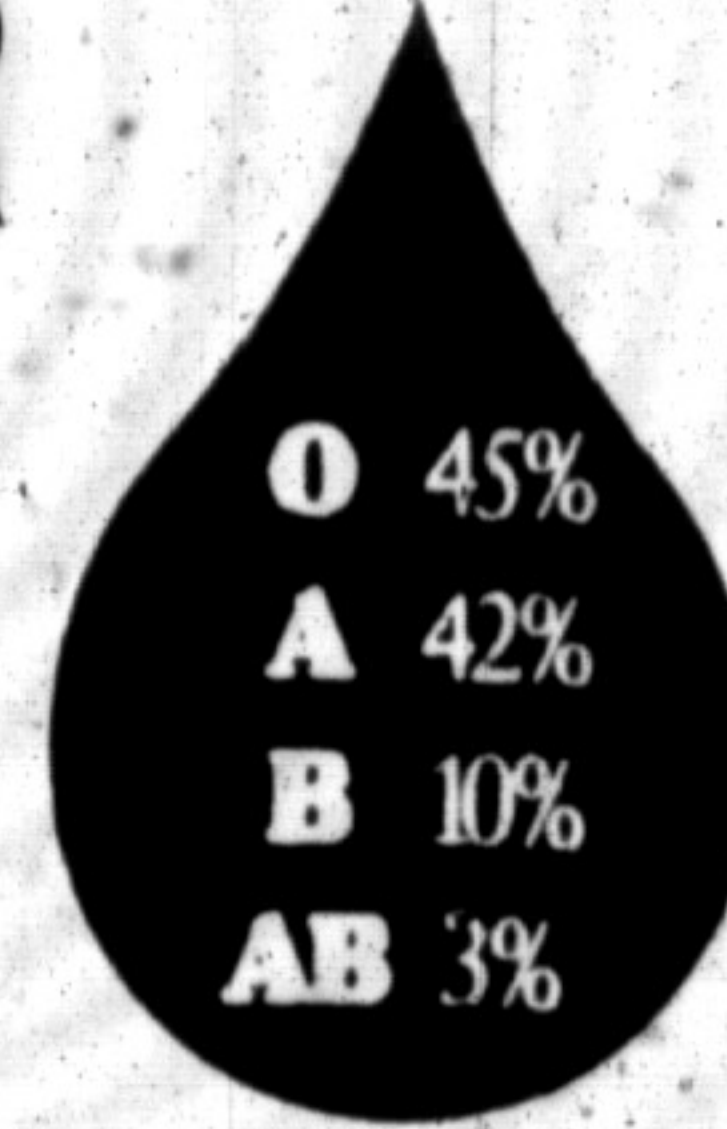

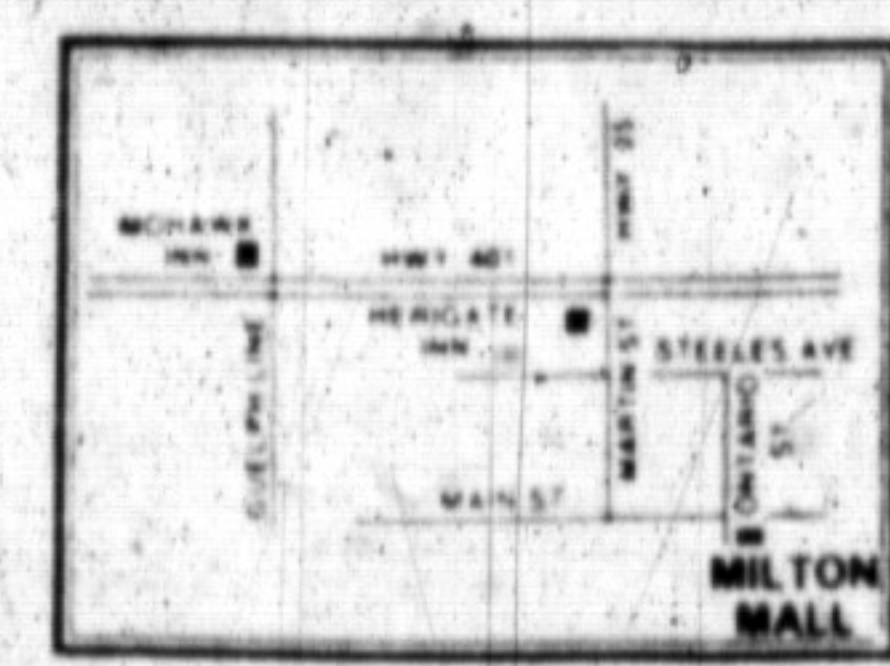
